

Marsha Mildon and I got to talking about capital P political concerns. We were speculating on the horrors of a Canada with Stockwell Day at the

helm. Our speculations may, alas, become reality. Stockwell

Day is the current finance minister in Ralph K l e i n ' s Alberta Tory cabinet. He

admits in a Vancouver Sun column to Fundamentalist Christian beliefs. He was the man who took up the legal cudgel against an Alberta teacher tossed out of a Christian teaching institution because he was homosexual. Day is also bilingual, Ontario-born and raised, and he's a major player in the daily running of Alberta's government. He is, we speculated, wrongly highly-rated for his balanced budget and his keen fiscal responsibility. As Marsha, who spends a lot of time in Edmonton as editor of Law Now magazine pointed out, who wouldn't have a balanced budget with all that oil and gambling money pouring into the coffers?

While the Canadian Alliance is looking to a new future under a man with whom they could actually win, Stockwell Day, we at home are seeing some other nasty possibilities—a liberal government with Gordon Campbell at the helm.

The NDP may have its flaws, but it is still the best party we have going for us. With the NDP we have enjoyed accessible government. We've been listened to and won. Sure, there have been NDP mistakes and major gaffs. But we haven't seen a fundamentalist chapel in the legislature or shady personal deals made with a lady in a funny hat.

When the time comes to vote, let's not forget who applied *human* rights to gays and lesbians living here. Let's remember that the more Stockwell Days emerging from the political right there are, the more likely we are to be targets of greater and greater discrimination. This morning I read the federal Tories are too far left. Yikes!

What are we facing if Stockwell Day gets in? And he might, you know. A general flat tax—supports everyone but the poor—a rescinding of legislature supporting equal rights for gays and lesbians, in fact it may once again be a crime to be gay. (If in Alberta being gay is good enough reason to be fired from a job, can "criminalization" be far away?)

Consider also a return to capital punishment, a rescinding of gun control laws. This is going to be one happy country to live in.

Don't tell me the March 4 fight at The Limit led by white guys in white muscle shirts wasn't a gay bashing. Don't tell me Noel Black and Kayshalee Snider don't have reason to be afraid when they call to talk of threats to their lives from bullies who find us easy targets.

We need to start looking at the broad political picture. And before it's too late, we need something in place to support those victims of lesbigay prejudice and hatred.

History has a lot of lessons to teach us. Germany was a wonderful place in which to be gay. Nobody worried about the odd harassment case. And then the far Right took over. Lavender Rhinoceros was founded February 1999

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It May Just Go Through – But Don't Hold Your Pens

There just aren't enough conservatives and dissident Liberals to stop the Government's domestic partnership bill, and the public supports it by a landside.

The Canadian Parliament on February 21 approved by an overwhelming 160 - 61 the government's omnibus measure to amend 68 federal statutes to give samegender couples legal status equal to that of unmarried heterosexual couples. The vote on its second reading sends C-23 on to the Commons Justice Committee for hearings. Clearly opposition from the Reform Party and from more than a dozen dissidents among the ruling Liberal Party will not be enough to stop the bill inspired by the Supreme Court of Canada's May 1999 ruling in M v. H.

government's bill has landslide public support, according to a 1998 survey commissioned by the Ministry of Justice.

EGALE (Equality for Gays and Lesbians Everywhere) was particularly pleased by the government's commitment. Prime Minister Jean Chretien did not allow the Liberals to vote their consciences. Chretien invited Liberal dissidents to absent themselves or abstain. EGALE urges us to call, to lobby or to write MPs in support of the bill. Reports indicate that calls opposing the bill are so far running far ahead.

The Liberal dissidents are sometimes referred to by their less-conservative colleagues as the "God Squad" who, while they don't agree on every issue, are fairly unanimous in their opposition to equal treatment of gays and lesbians. They believe, from different denominational viewpoints, that the

Bible declares homosexual acts to be sinful and they want them kept private, not endorsed by government. Their numbers include MPs Murray Calder, Pat O'Brien, Paul Steckle, Rose-Marie Ur, and Tom Wappel. Thirteen Liberals reportedly voted against C-23 on its second reading.

The larger number of opposition votes comes from the Reform Party. Although it, too, has consistently opposed equal treatment of gays and lesbians, it is working for two amendments to C-23. One would be the addition of a formal statement that marriage – as opposed to the "common law partners/ conjoints de fait" term applied to both unmarried heterosexual and same-gen-(Cont'd page 4)

der couples under the bill – is between one man and one woman.

The other amendment would be the extension of legal recognition to all economically interdependent couples. That's something Justice Minister Anne McLellan has not ruled out for the future, and has said her department is researching. But the government will not allow for it in the current Modernizing Benefits and Obligations Bill in part because it does not have the same weight of judicial rulings behind it.

Reform has jeered the Liberal Party for allowing judicial activism to dictate its actions, but a COMPAS poll commissioned by the National Post and reported February 18 has found that many Canadians disagree. Overall, 43% nationwide, supported the power of the courts to make law and only 28% rejected it, while the remainder was undecided. Of those who supported the courts, 31% said judges had taken "too little power away from elected officials" and 12% said ""far too little." By province, Quebecois were the most resistant to judicial power with a total of 33% reading judges as taking "too much" or "far too much" power - yet even in Quebec, a plurality of 39% saw the courts taking "too little" or "far too little" power. Quebec has also shown some of the strongest support for recognition of same-gender couples, including modifying its provincial laws. In some provinces, the power of the courts was supported by up to 55% of respondents.

The poll surveyed 500 Canadians through January 26; results have a margin of error of 4.5%.

I'm Not Colour Blind... I Am Colour Deaf

I've had a challenge with colours all my life. Is that greenish brown, or brownish green? Is that royal blue, or navy blue? Why are there 53 shades of purple? Aren't some of them really mauve? Or violet? Or some other "colour?"

This difficulty has many times given rise to accusations that I'm colour blind. I have believed that, sometimes, although mostly because I thought that not being able to tell what a colour was amounted to being colour blind, This perlexed me, since I have passed a number of colour-blindness tests. I can read the numbers and discern the symbols without difficulty - I just can't tell you what colour they are; I don't know their names.

I recently heard that this experience is referred to as being "colour deaf." This made instant sense. I'm not colour blind; I can see the colours, and tell them apart. I just can't hear the names which most people use to describe them; I'm colour deaf.

This is a much more profound insight than might seem apparent, but unfortunately I don't have the time or space to go into all the details now. Except to comment on a sort of parallel (which seems to also involve a frequent topic of conversation in my universe).


I am always keen to see things in a larger context, and note the patterns which duplicate themselves on multiple levels. Thus, my challenge with labelling colours becomes a metaphor for how we relate to one another, how we colour/catergorize/label/stereotype one another. It is politically correct for us – according to social expectations – to be colour blind. (At this point, you may substitute whichever label you wish for "colour:" religion, race, sex, gender ... ; tall, short, fat, skinny ... ;African, Alien, Asian ... ; whatever.)

One of the ways in which so many of us do not walk our talk involves our

belief that we are politically correct, that we are colour blind. It's not nice to notice that someone's young/old/black/ white/Christian/pagan/whatever. So we pretend that we don't, a powerful manifestation of denial. (Speaking of denial, why do so many of us insist on referring to ourselves as white when even the palest hermits are more of a beige colour? But what do I know? I can tell the colours apart, but I get lost among the names.)

One of the ways in which so many of us do not walk our talk involves our belief that we are politically correct, that we are colour blind. It's not nice to notice that someone's young/old/black/white/Christian/pagan/whatever.

I don't even think that being colour blind is an evolutionary goal. I think being colour deaf is much more appropriate to proceeding along our walk. I can see the colours/whatever; I am not colour blind. But I don't have time or



This resonates particularly strongly with my pagan/Craft/Buddhist/Taoist/ etc. philosophy that there are only two perspectives of reality - those of the individual, and that amorphous collective reality of the whole. We can group individuals into herds, if we really have to. But if we deny that we recognize which herd they come from, we don't realize all the little unconscious ways in which we deny the individual, and make it clear we do recognize the label(s) they carry, and the unconscious ways in which we relate to them according to our personal stereotypes for the particular labels we've assigned them.

Progress toward the Cosmic concept of dealing with colour/whatever – whether magenta. cyan, red...– involves having colour sight, being able to relate to the unique individual as a unique part of an infinite spectrum which comprises the whole rainbow. But it also requires being colour/whatever deaf, not paying attention to group labels, because – after all – they're applicable to neither the unique individual nor the whole.

Dear Barbara,

Further to your March editorial, I would like to reiterate comments that I made at a Febru-

ary 21 meeting with yourself and other representatives from the gay and lesbian community. In our discussion on the 21st, I stated that I respect all sectors of our community and am committed to promoting an open and inclusive government that listens to and is responsive to all citizens. I further emphasized that in my role as Mayor I have to make my decisions with the entire population in mind.



Originally, there was some exception taken to comments I made in the February edition of Island Christian Info. In that interview, I responded honestly to a direct question regarding my personal position with regards to the gay and lesbian pride parade. I stated that while I may not believe in the pa-

rade or advocate it personally, the local gay and lesbian population is an important part of our community and as such, should be supported. My reference to the Charter of Rights was cited only to emphasize the point that all citizens by law have a right to publicly express their personal beliefs.

I strongly support the separation of church and state and it is unfortunate that my comments were interpreted in a manner that implied I endorsed hatred. I take great exception to comments made by Barbara McLauchlin in the March 2 edition of Monday Magazine stating that I endorse hatred and gay-bashing. I believe my record and actions demonstrate a belief in, and commitment to, the principle of inclusion. In speaking about my personal values, my intent was to emphasize my belief in respect, compassion and tolerance for the views and concerns of our entire community.

I apologize to the Lesbian and Gay community for the extent to which this misunderstanding has been elevated and perpetuated. I sincerely hope, and believe, that we can work together to create a more tolerant and livable city for all peoples.

Everyone's buzzing about Bill C-23 – or are they? EGALE is asking for support from gays and lesbians by writing to their MP and the Prime Minister. Recent alerts from EGALE

are calling for the government to do the right thing. But what is the right thing?

While benefits for same-gender spouses are certainly warranted, and the protection and support of children, in any relationship, is absolutely essential, I never remember anyone asking me if I wanted to be included in the homogenous world of marriage, sameness and "gee, we're just like you."

When did EGALE conduct a referendum of gays and lesbians asking us if we want all this? Do

we want to be recognized as equal or do we want an tins? Do ognized as "the same?" We're certainly neither in the eyes of many ordinary people (and politicians aren't a part of that group). I'm not the same as a straight man, nor do I ever want to be considered as the same. My relationship is not the same as a heterosexual relationship – similar in many aspects, but definitely not the same.

Gays and lesbians have always been in the enviable position of being able to determine, from scratch, what our relationships will look like. Unlike our straight counterparts who are handed a template from the time they're little kids. I suppose in many respects, despite Bill C-23, we'll still have the ability to shape our own futures, but I fear that the pressure placed on us by those involved in the "gay and lesbian rights movement" will steer us toward the blandness of weddings, summers in the mobile home and gingham curtains.

Who exactly are the people attempting to determine the future for gays and lesbians? Do they live next door to me? I don't think so. I think, like in any movement, there are a few people doing a great deal of work which is believed to be in the best interests of the rest of us. And that's scary. When

Je Me Souviens A Winner!

memories of an expatriate Anglophone Montréalaise, Québecoise exiled in Canada

An evening at the theatre should be entertaining, provocative, and lead to rich discussions at a café afterwards. The Belfry's recent production, Je me souviens, did all of the above.

A one-woman show written and performed by Lorena Gale, the play takes a look at what it's like to be a black woman, an Anglophone from Montreal, who finds herself living in Vancouver. Referring to her character's status as "an exile in Canada," Gale brings all the strangeness of Canada's multiple identities into sharp relief.

Slide images projected behind the acting space portray a changing Montreal from the '50s through to the present. The combination of Gale's high-energy performance, the intimate space of the Belfry's studio theatre, the intensity of the subject matter, and the striking projected images forces us to share pain, humour, intellectual and political challenges with Gale. There is no escaping this performance, no way to sit back and merely be entertained. The show is compelling and engaging and it would be difficult to emerge from the theatre unmoved.

Gale's first play, Angelique ,was nominated for eight Audelco Awards (New York Black Theatre Awards), and was nominated for Outstanding New Play in Calgary's Betty Mitchell Awards. Here's my vote for bringing the play to Victoria. If Je me souviens is any indication, Angelique would be a show worth seeing.

Isn't a business plan something you need to get a bank loan? Not necessarily. F. Danielle Allen set hers up to help her define her goals. I needed to know what it was I wanted to focus on, where I wanted to be in a year and what I would need to get there, she told me over tea.

Help and guidance is also useful and she urges new entrepreneurs to commit to working with a business coach. "Everyone should have one," she affirms.

Already that first business plan is a thing of the past and Danielle is holding to long-term dreams and aspirations as well.

Danielle is in an unusual business but

one that offers service as the most fundamental and deepest level. Nutrition, good health and cleansing.

Hmmm. Tell me more.

Danielle's business is actually a three-parter. She offers instruction and recommendations on nutrition, helps clients to a better lifestyle and gets right down to the root of the problem offering colon cleansings.

"Your colon is either a life-line or a death-trap."

Well, I'd certainly heard that before. A toxic colon, Danielle explains, can be the cause of constipation or diarrhea, fatigue, skin problems, parasites, backaches, menstrual problems, intestinal gas, prostrate problems, allergies, depression, hypertension, insomnia, headaches. Gads!

Well, we do spring clean our houses. And we do change the oil on our cars. Makes sense to me.

Daniellle is a very attractive woman. Having a colon cleansing seems to me to be fairly intimate. Well, you get the picture.

Actually, men aren't shy at all coming to me. Nor are women or my lesbian friends, says Danielle. I'll even tell my clients my partner's name is Dawn and we co-parent her child, if we get to talking personally. I have to be vulnerable and I believe my openness and honesty attract my customers. "At first I've had friends or acquaintances say 'I'm not coming because it's you.' And then they phone me later and say 'I'm coming because it's you.""

Danielle keeps the F part of her name on her business card. Her first name is Faith and as she told Michael Losier, her business coach, who suggested she drop the F, "I want to keep the Faith!"

Faith and hard work and wise advice and being open and vulnerable and ready to go with the flow seems to be working for this young entrepreneur, she's 34, who sees herself running a health care centre in the future.

Her work is preventive medicine. For example, her nutritional work involves determining blood type and suggesting foods type O or type A might want to avoid, for example. Eating right, elimination, cleansing, maintaining high fibre, wholesome diet, drinking plenty of purified water daily, exercising daily and avoiding stress all add up to laughing and enjoying life.

In her spare time Danielle rides a motorcycle, reads Oprah's list of books, camps with Dawn in their Westphalia and attends a spiritually centred women's group.

She has her logo tatooed on her arm. Ask her to explain it to you when you go for a consultation, cleansing, nutritional advice and lifestyle change.

people around me doing this all the time. It's frustrating and demoralizing and if we're not careful. It can damage our ability to grow what we want in the gardens of our lives.

I've learned that it makes better sense to take a tip from gardeners and approach the situation a little differently. If there's something you want to plant Sounds simple, I know. I'm surprised at how regularly I meet people at networking groups who have forgotten or ran out of their business cards.

(2) Wear a name tag. When your name tag says who you are and what you do, it is easier for others to make conversation with you.

(3) Door Prizes. At many networking groups, you will have an opportunity to give away a door prize. Your product or service will get mentioned in a special way with attentive people listening.

(4) Set a goal. Eliminate your anxiety about having to meet everyone. Set a realistic goal that you know is attainable – perhaps three to four people at each meeting. (5) Respect others. If there is someone to whom you want to talk and they are engaged in a conversation, respect their time with the other person and don't interrupt them. Stand off to the side. They will see that you want to talk to them. Bad manners may break in advance any rapport you hope to develop.

(6) Go often and be seen. Volunteer to help set up the meeting and meet new business connections.

(7) Have fun and be enthusiastic about your business.

in your life, take a good look around your garden first. There may be work to do here before it is able to sustain new growth.

We can't control the passing of seasons or the amount of rain or sun that our gardens receive. But we can do lots to amend the soil, find out where things should be planted so they'll flourish, and make sure that unwanted plants with far-reaching and tenacious root systems have a harder time taking root than the things we are choosing to grow.

Here are a few tips for your next gardening season:

If what you truly want to grow isn't available to plant just yet, or if the season's not right, take a tip from gardeners and plant a suitable fill-in crop something that will feed nutrients to the soil, prevent weeds from taking over, and be pleasing to look at or eat while waiting to put in the dream crop.

Life is too short to spend it looking longingly over the back fence at the neighbour's yard. If there's someone you know who is successfully growing things which whither and die in your yard, ask for advice on what you could be doing differently. Gardeners are generous with sharing their know-how and so are most people who've attained success in an area.

Create space. Sometimes the only way to get things to flower is to give them a good pruning.

While you're busy preparing to plant what you really want, don't forget to pay attention to the seeds that blow in on the wind and take root with no effort on your part. These are nature's volunteers and one of them may well grow up to be a plant you like even better than what you had chosen to grow.

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

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How To Give A Cat A Pill

1) Pick cat up and cradle it in the crook of your left arm as if holding a baby. Position right forefinger and thumb on either side of cat's mouth and gently apply pressure to cheeks while holding pill in right hand. As cat opens mouth pop pill into mouth. Allow cat to close mouth and swallow.

2) Retrieve pill from floor and cat from behind sofa. Cradle cat in left arm and repeat process.

3) Retrieve cat from bedroom, and throw soggy pill away.

4) Take new pill from foil wrap, cradle cat in left arm holding rear paws tightly

with left hand. Force jaws open and push pill to back of mouth with right forefinger. Hold mouth shut for a count of ten.

5) Retrieve pill from goldfish bowl and cat from top of wardrobe. Call spouse from garden.

6) Kneel on floor with cat wedged firmly between knees, hold front and rear paws. Ignore low growls emitted by cat. Get spouse to hold head firmly with one hand while forcing wooden ruler into mouth. Drop pill down ruler and rub cat's throat vigorously.

7) Retrieve cat from curtain rail, get another pill from foil wrap. Make note to buy new ruler and repair curtains. Carefully sweep shattered figurines and vases from hearth and set to one side for gluing later.

8) Wrap cat in large towel and get spouse to lie on cat with head just visible from below armpit. Put pill in end

of drinking straw, force mouth open with straw and blow down drinking straw.

> 9) Check label to make sure pill not harmful to humans, drink glass of water to take taste away. Apply Band-Aid to spouse's forearm and remove blood from carpet with cold water and soap.

10) Retrieve cat from neighbour's shed. Get another pill. Place cat in cupboard and close door onto neck

to leave head showing. Force mouth open with dessert spoon. Flick pill down throat with elastic band.

11) Fetch screwdriver from garage and put cupboard door back on hinges. Apply cold compress to cheek and check records for date of last tetanus shot. Throw Tee-shirt away and fetch new one from bedroom.

12) Call fire brigade to retrieve cat from tree across the road. Apologise to neighbour who crashed into fence while swerving to avoid cat. Take last pill from foil-wrap.



14) Get spouse to drive you to the emergency room, sit quietly while doctor stitches fingers and forearm and removes pill remnants from right eye. Call furniture shop on way home to order new table.

Queer Spirit By Zorya Plaskin

In the realm of institutional religion, perhaps no revolution is more unheralded than that which is slowly but inexorably gaining ground within the Roman Catholic community.

And Dennis Benoit, who arrived in Victoria less than a year ago, is quickly becoming a powerful agent of change, particularly in regard to the acceptance and celebration of queer spirituality.

"I have to do something," Dennis says. "If I have the opportunity just to be that voice crying in the wilderness ... I feel I'm being worthwhile on this earth [and that] I'm being a conscience to the church."

Dennis is not so naive as to think a new order is just around the corner, but he is confident that it is inevitable. "The cracks are there, in the church. And I think it's going to come. It might take another generation, but I still feel it's on its way. To me it's sort of like a parable that Jesus left. You can't put new wine into old wineskins. Something has to give. And the present structure to me is that old wine skin."

Dennis was born into the Catholic community and educated in Edmonton's Catholic schools. He then entered the Franciscan order, which took him to California where he spent a year as a noviciate and three years studying theology. He did not pursue his plans to enter the priesthood, though, because he "felt at the time that the religious life was too intense." He was also becoming conscious of his sexual orientation, "but that itself is not the primary reason" for abandoning his studies.

He actually gave up going to church

for awhile, but "I did not give up on God. That was no problem. But I did not feel comfortable in the institutional church. And being active in a Catholic parish, I felt, was too family-oriented."

Back in Edmonton, Dennis drifted back into the church because "something was missing. I did not want to abandon the spirituality and the theology. There's a whole body there that I found useful. And some of the music, some of the liturgies are good. And I didn't want to abandon that. So I drifted back – but not coming out."

Although still in the closet, he knew

"who I was, that I was a homosexual person. And I now use the words homosexually blessed, because I think of it as a gift from God. Even though I cannot prove it's a gift from God any more than I can prove the existence of God itself."

Then one day Dennis saw an advertisement in Edmonton's Catholic newspaper, an ad from Dignity Canada which was organizing a conference. "It just blew my mind. There are gay Catholics around! I'd sort of suspected there were." Dignity was established in 1969 – the same year as the Stonewall riots - as a support group for gay and lesbian Catholics. The organization has grown to more than 100 chapters across the U.S. as well as sister organizations in Canada, the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand, France, Italy, South Africa and elsewhere. In many chapters, Dignity provides the only experience some lesbian and gay people have with Catholic liturgy.

Operating outside the church proper, Dignity is committed to spiritual growth and development through liturgical celebrations, retreats and days of recollection, personal prayer, and study of scripture, theology and ethics. Dignity also welcomes people of all faith traditions, not only Catholics – although that is its primary focus. "When I come across people of other faith traditions," Dennis says, "it really strengthens my faith, because now I'm humbled because I'm just a small part of this whole universe, this whole creation. And I see the whole thing as a tapestry, that God

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has different faces, and we all have a little aspect of the truth."

Finding Dignity was Dennis' major coming out experience. "Being in the same room with other gay Catholics was really a breath of fresh air," especially being "able to discuss sexuality and spirituality openly without fear of anything else."

Being gay and Catholic is a challenge, since "of all the Christian churches, I think the Catholic Church is the most hierarchical. And the higher up you go, the more homophobic it gets."

But Dennis believes that "the homophobia that's present in the church is not present in every member in the Catholic Church. Even part of the clergy are understanding, but they are sort of in a silent majority right now. So there is some acceptance there." However, when pressed against the wall, supportive clergy revert to the official teachings, he added. The "they will, of course, toe the line."

Dennis is not spiritually out yet in Victoria, in that he's not active in any parish. But since the beginning of this year he has become active in setting up Victoria's first Dignity chapter. About a half dozen Catholics meet the last Sunday of every month for liturgical celebrations followed by discussion. Jim and Jack doubled as peer support for the gay and straight members of their upisland community. As well, Egan served terms in Courtenay's civic government. A lot of people, for a lot of reasons, have need to be grateful for Jim Egan's time on earth.

A celebration of Egan's life is planned for Saturday, March 25, 1-4 pm at the Courtenay Fish and Game Club on Robert Lang Drive. At Egan's request no funeral will be held. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to EGALE. - Barb McLauchlin

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What's A Word's Worth?



Sitting at your government-issue desk mentally composing your letter of resignation? Longing to buy a big old

house in James Bay and open a B&B with your sweetie? Don't quit the day job to start your own business until you've picked up a copy of *In the Pink: The Making of Successful Gay- and Lesbian-Owned Businesses*, by Sue Levin (Harrington Park Press, 1999).

Based on surveys completed by hundreds of gay business-owners in the USA, this book has lots to offer someone considering life as an entrepreneur. Clearly organized, the book starts right at the beginning. What are the common qualities of an entrepreneur? What experiences are useful? What gay-related factors motivate us as small-business owners? It then proceeds to discuss the nuts and bolts of starting and running a small business.

For each subject covered, Levin uses real-life examples to illustrate her points. Hearing about the trials, tribulations, and successes of other gay business owners is both inspiring and humbling. Businesses of all sizes and types are repre-



sented (from software developers like Quark to caterers, publishers, jewelers, cafes, and construction companies). Levin tackles issues of interest to any business owner. However,

> the gay focus of the book allows her to cover such issues as whether or not to come out to your customers, how useful it is to target our community in your marketing plan, the effect of AIDS on gay business, and some of the pitfalls (and benefits) of going into business with your partner.

A balanced mix of inspiration and prac-

tical advice, this is a useful (and entertaining) read for anyone toying with the idea of going into business. Once you've made the decision to go for it, there is a comprehensive listing of additional references at the end of the book.


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Purchasing Property With Your Partner

Buying a home is exciting! Whether it's your first or your tenth home, your primary residence or a revenue prop-

erty, the anticipation and excitement that go into the purchase are greater than when you make the decision to buy almost anything else. Not to mention that it's probably more money

than you will ever spend on any other acquisition.

When you buy a piece of property, the dream-maker comes out to play, questions arise and your brains begin to whirl. What color will we paint the walls? How will we lay out the kitchen? What about the garden, where will the fruit trees go? Will we have room for our parents? We plan for the future, we prepare a nest and we experience optimism at its finest hour.

Same-gender partners are absolutely no different (as we all know), from opposite gender partners when buying property. We experience the same thrills of this nesting ritual as any of our friends or families who happen to be straight. When the actual act of purchasing our abode occurs, the rules are identical. As with any other couple, all you need to decide is whether you wish to hold the property as Joint Tenants or Tenants in Common. Holding the property refers to the title and how the land and improvements are to be legally registered.

Of course, your lawyer is the person to advise you on which form of ownership will be most appropriate in your individual circumstance. However, to help you understand a little before you

start the process, I will explain briefly the differences between Joint Tenancy and Tenants in Common. Joint Tenancy is how many heterosexually married couples hold property. The property is held jointly and undivided. The greatest benefit to a Joint Tenancy, is in the situation where one partner predeceases the other. The surviving partner would become the sole owner of the subject property. In this case, the property should not be held up with the processing of estates and possible claims with the deceased partner's family or other beneficiaries. It is a very clear definition as to the intentions of the property owners.

Tenants in Common, on the other hand, allows for ownership of property that is somewhat more flexible. By that I mean two (or more) individuals can own portions of a home. One partner may wish to legally own a greater share of the property; this can be achieved by registering the title as Tenants in Common. In this case, one person, for example, can hold 40% and the other could hold 60%. Looking at this from an estate perspective, the owned portion can easily be willed to a beneficiary. However, the property will be tied up in the legal ramifications of the probate system.

Whichever way you choose to hold your property, is entirely up to you. The bottom line — the right way is whatever you feel comfortable with.

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ARIBA! Add Zip To Lobster Dish With Tequila

Just by uttering the word "tequila" at a gathering of people, one is guaranteed to hear more than a few moans. Everyone who has tried this Mexican menace knows its deadly nature. It earns the nickname "Te-kill-ya" well indeed.

Classically, the scenario goes like this. All are primed for a funf i l l e d evening of laughter and merriment when

a guest arrives with a 40-ounce bottle of tequila and announces "It's shooter time!" (I know you've been there, I can tell by the look on your face.) Out come the lemons and the salt. At first you are reluctant, unsure of the whole situation. Until you have had your first shot and everyone is hollering, "ARIBA!" By the second shot you are really getting the hang of it — even love the taste. "The lemons cut the alcohol and they're packed with vitamins too," you reassure yourself. You slam back your third shot and by this time you are starting to feel like you've bought a one-way ticket to Mexico. Many people have said that tequila is more like a drug than a drink, and you feel like you really understand. You start to see cacti and ponchos, beaches and sombreros. You think the world is one big taco bar and you are dishing out a huge helping with extra salsa on the side. Suddenly, everything changes. The next thing you see is white porcelain, a big bowl of it. You are heaving every ounce of liquid from your stomach and wondering if you are ever going to feel good again.

I saw a T-shirt once with a picture of a guy on the front who was lying flat out, completely dazed. The caption above his head was: "One tequila, two tequila, three tequila, FLOOR." I laughed and we exchanged knowing glances.

Nonetheless, many of us are still charmed by tequila's magical powers. It has its place and understanding that place is the key to living in harmony with tequila. I no longer slam it. Instead I drink to taste it. While travelling in Mexico I ordered a shot and was promptly handed the tequila menu. Like a tourist, I picked one that "sounded nice." Also on that trip I discovered La-Co-Ca-Ra-Cha which is a drink made of 1/3 tequila and 2/3 kahlua. It is delicious but its service is the most entertaining aspect. One waiter lit the elixir on fire and poured it gracefully from one silver gravy boat to another. Meanwhile, the other waiter placed a bandana around my neck and an ice-filled funnel in my mouth. The whole concoction was poured down my throat as the entire restaurant bellowed "La-Co-Ca-Ra-Cha". While at home here in Victoria, I opt for the civilized approach of drinking it out of a glass.

Tequila has many uses. Don't be afraid of it. Use it to marinate fish or brush it on a chocolate cake for a little extra zip. Introduce it back into your life with caution for you never know when it's going to sneak up on you again and reap its revenge.

Lobster Hot Pepper Pasta with Creamy Tequila Sauce serves 4

2/3 lb. pasta
4 cloves garlic minced
2 tbsp. olive oil
1/4 tsp. dried red pepper flakes
2 tbsp. tequila
8 roma tomatoes, diced
1/3 cup whipping cream
6 ounces cooked lobster (other
a shellfish such as crab can be substituted)
s fresh parmesan, grated

Bring to boil a large pot of salted water. Add pasta and cook until desired tenderness. Drain.

While pasta is cooking, warm olive oil in fry pan and add garlic and dried pepper flakes, heating gently. Sauté until soft and fragrant. Remove from heat. Add tequila and stand back as the alcohol may flame up! Return to heat and boil gently for a minute. Add tomatoes to pan and sauté. Add cream next and cook several more minutes. Season with salt and pepper and then add the lobster. Add more cream if desired and serve immediately tossed with pasta and topped with parmesan cheese.

Melaney At The Movies

The pINCO Triangle directors: Patrick Crowe and Ruth Whiston

Who knew Northern Ontario had such a sense of humour? If there are more Sudbury natives like directors/ cinematographers Patrick Crowe and Ruth Whiston, there is hope yet for homophobic, redneck INCO Nickel.

Just how many miners snuck off to inspect each other's shafts in the dark underground caverns beneath Sudbury's pride and joy? How many would admit to it? Are there lesbians brave enough to remain in Sudbury, loud and proud?

And did you know that the terrain surrounding Sudbury was used as a model for both before *and* after shots of the effects of a nuclear holocaust? Just how picture perfect were those miners profiled in the INCO newsletter?

Crowe and Whiston blow the blasting caps off the lives of Sudbury nickel minions with an entertaining blend of satire, cheesy newsreel footage, interviews and music featuring none other than Parachute Club's Lorraine Segato.

The humour is truly homegrown Canadian, the production numbers hilarious and the education value gentle. While not a classic, it's a welcome comic relief in the œuvre of traditionally dark and convoluted Canadian independent filmmaking.

Two Brides and A Scalpel director: Mark Achbar

In deep contrast, this documentary about a Nanaimo man's quest for gender reassignment and her ultimate legal marriage to a lesbian (he was biologically still male at the time of the ceremony) left me both moved and disturbed.

Faithfully documented by partners Georgina and Linda, this is a story that undoubtedly sparked many a discussion about the natures of gender and love. It is at times funny, moving, painful and challenging. It is always honest, courageous and lovingly intimate in its portrayal of the relationship between two people who overcome amazing obstacles to love each other.

Graphic depictions of gender reassignment surgical procedures and Georgina's reaction to them are among the most difficult and enlightening scenes of the documentary. As both the psychological motivations and ramifications of physical gender reassignment are beyond my understanding, I don't feel qualified to comment on them. But from a purely clinical point of view, the physical transformation is profound.






