I arrived in Victoria just before Flagrant ceased publishing, and have wished for a newsletter ever since. As nobody else has started one, and now that I am half-owner of a personal computer, I've decided to make my wish come true.

Other than the monthly Coffee House and the annual GALA, all lesbian activity in our town seems to take place in private. There is no ongoing public sense in which we are a community. The main aim of this newsletter is to provide us with a public sense of ourselves, as well as to function as a safe forum for communication and exploration.

A second aim is to provide a supportive forum for Victoria lesbians wanting to share their written poetry, short fiction and non-fiction. Some of you have already submitted suitable material, which I have been delighted to print in this issue. Your part in all this is first to subscribe and to get all your lesbian friends, family, colleagues and lovers to do the same. That's how I'll be able to afford to continue publishing. Next, you should let me know what you like and don't like about the newsletter so that you have a chance of getting what you want. Third, give me material. posted on local events and news you think other lesbians should know about. If you don't like to write but want to share ideas, get somebody to interview you.

CODEPENDENCY

Codependence is a word that is used a lot lately in addressing the movement towards healthier relationships, both with ourselves and others. A number of good books deal with this issue in depth. In writing the following we are sharing how codependency has affected our lives. Some of you may recognize yourselves; to you we want simply to say that there is hope for change.

I first became aware of codependency about a year ago. I had been suffering much of my life from low self-esteem and even less selflove. I looked to people and things outside myself for reassurance of my worth as a human being. While this took the form of acceptable behaviour (model student and daughter, good friend, sociable person), what drove me was a compulsive need to please others, to be liked, to be accepted; I was willing to give up my self for approval and love.

This showed up most painfully in my intimate relationships with women. As I became intimate, the independent, self-assured me was transformed into a needy, dependent and insecure me: I didn't know where I stopped and my lover began. The transformation was disturbing to my lovers, and terrifying to me. Fear of losing my self eventually translated itself into no intimate relationships at all. More distressing was the belief I held that I was a flawed human being who wasn't good enough and never would be.

I am now in the process of healing and learning self-love; this began with the discovery and acceptance that I have been suffering from the emotionally disabling condition called codependence. I am learning that all the people-pleasing, loss of self and fear of intimacy is rooted in an unhealthy family background where I learned my ways of being and thinking. With this comes the awareness that I can unlearn these ways. I can change. Who I am is just fine. I'm on my way now to a healthier framework of selflove and self-care. There's work to be done and I'm on my way.

Codependency...it's a word I heard about six years ago, when I was doing couple counselling with my ex-lover. The therapist wanted me to start looking at my behavior as a contributing factor to the problems in the relationship. At first I was indignant: there was nothing wrong with me...she's the alcoholic (albeit recovering) and a pot addict and if she would just change a bit, then I would be happier and the relationship would work.

It took three years before I could admit to myself and others that my behavior and my attitudes were contributing to the dis-ease of my relationship. I started to attend support groups where other people were looking at themselves and not blaming the alcoholic or drug addict for the pain and the difficulties in their lives. My insights at this time were new and exciting, but as I looked back on my other significant relationships, I realized that my behavior was part of an old pattern that dates back to my family of origin.

As an adult I have tended to choose people with addictions. By judging and criticizing them, I didn't have to look at me. Ultimately, I believed that as soon as my lover was "fixed", then she would take care of me and transform my unmanageable life....Surprise! It never worked.

Now, in the process of recovery, I still struggle with the same issues but I now recognize my behavior and take responsibility for it. As a result, I am developing a greater respect and acceptance of myself and my lover.

BEYOND SISSINGHURST


As a lesbian who loves the growing world around us, particularly plants, I offer my contribution to this publication. I hope to share my enthusiasm for plants, both wild and cultivated, and to answer your queries.

Plants are amazingly apolitical, yet continually embroiled in political controversy. The Stein Valley, South Moresby, Strathcona Park. C.P.R. brush control, 'hack and squirt', Eurasian Milfoil. Opium, coca, cannabis. Diazinon, Glyphosate, Casaron. We all require six inches of topsoil capable of growing plants to survive.

For those of you who love to garden or romp in the woods, this column should provide tasty tidbits for your perusal. For the unconverted...turn the page.

This month, I offer an introduction to the naming of plants. I'm often asked how I remember the botanical names of plants. My training as a horticulturalist introduced me to plants by their botanical names, and in the way that I might know a friend as Jane Doe, I know a plant in a similar fashion. I recognize who she is and how she looks. Common names are like nicknames - one person may have many - and for identification purposes, a nickname is too vague.

In the taxonomic scheme of things, we describe plants using their Genus, Species and sometimes Sub-species or Variety or Cultivated Variety (abbr. cv.) in that order. Our common potato is called Solanum tuberosum. If you plant one red variety called Pontiac, for instance, the full title would be Solanum Tuberosum cv. Pontiac.



honor a person (real or mythological). Our Rho dodendrons are descriptively named. The word is derived from the Greek 'rhodos' for red and 'dendron' for tree. The title is appropriate prior to extensive hybridization most wild Rhododendrons exhibited red flower trusses. Aboriginal names are abundant. Latin titles include Acer (maples), Betula (birches) and Cornus (dogwoods). Colchicums, the autumn crocuses, are named for Colchis in Asia Minor where the plants abound. A bog plant native to our area. Andromeda polifolia, is named for the Greek Goddess Andromeda.

Specific names, or the Species name, originate in a similar fashion

but frequently emphasize description. Returning to Andromeda polifolia, the specific epithet refers to the white underside of this plant's leaves: 'Poli' for white, 'folia' for foliage. Our native Western Red Cedar (not a true cedar) is specifically named for her pleated or 'plicate' foliage hence her name, Thuja plicata.

Varietal names describe either a wild or cultivated variety abbreviated as var. or cv. respectively. Although descriptive and geographical names still abound at this taxonomic level. the focus is frequently turned to the 'discoveror', cultivator or nursery caretaker most closely related to the plant. Here the incestuous plant fancier's world knows no limits. Friends of the family, wives, concubines, lovers and other assorted associates find a place in the books. Thousands of cv.'s are named for people. Unsurprisingly, women stereotypically have been associated with Rosa varieties: Ophelia, Mme. Butterfly, Rose Marie Viaud, Queen Elisabeth to name only a very few.

The value of botanical names to the gardener is primarily the guarantee that the plant named will be the plant purchased. Common names don't offer this universal reliability! Secondarily though, as a lover of language, nothing can be at the musical tones of exotic botanical names rolling off the tongue. Well, perhaps a few things can...
