



One event I consider a 'must-do' every summer is ride in the annual Victoria Pride Parade. Every year for the past three, I have donned my helmet and boots and taken my place at the front of the parade with other dykes on their bykes. (I should mention that last year, we had an "honorary dyke" with us—a gentle leatherman named Ernie.)

Besides getting to lead the parade and having traffic stopped for me (for once!), I love meeting other riders and socializing before the parade begins. There are some dykes (lesbians, if you prefer but it doesn't rhyme with bikes) who have been riding in the parade for as long as the parade has existed.

Some dykes get dressed up in costumes—some decorate their bikes. The bikes range from small scooters to big Goldwings, from cruisers to sports bikes to motorcross (they have to be street legal and insured) - and represent as much diversity as our community itself has. All riders and passengers have two things in

common though – a love of bikes and a big smile on their faces. In fact, I seem to be smiling for weeks after.

One good thing about leading the parade is arriving at Fisherman's Park before the rest of the parade, hopping off the bike (is parking for a bike ever a problem?) and watching the others as the parade enters the park. You get to be in the parade and watch it too.

Pride celebrations are about celebrating our diversity as the queer community – from the outrageous and lovely drag queens to the shy quiet librarian to the smiling dykes on bykes. It is the one day of the year where we are visible and there is safety in our numbers – it is, indeed, a celebration.

So, dykes with bykes.....this is an invitation. Pull your scoot out of the garage, polish up the chrome and paint, rev her up and get her ready for a good time. Come join the parade and have some fun –celebrate your pride! Join me at the front of the parade – start your engines please!

#### **Honoring Us**



This is the Pride Issue. Time to celebrate our sexuality whatever it may be and to be joined by P-FLAG and our allies. "Celebrate?" How does it translate to our pride and to our parade? I can quite understand Stacy of the Pride Society when he says he doesn't want the mayor in his parade. But, I also believe that the parade is our opportunity to celebrate more than ourselves. It's an opportunity to openly express our incredible desire to be thought of as a valuable resources in a growing and thriving community. It's a time to forget political views and shake hands with the society and the cultural mores of those who aren't us. #### **Pride and Prejudice**

There was a bomb blast in London and three people were killed. They weren't all gay, but they were all in a gay pub. The blast was connected to a single white male who, in previous weeks had targeted the Bangladeshi and Black districts of London. The bombs were an indication of the continued hatred that plagues our species – an odd species that is singular in its destructive nature.

We come together as communities, we live in one area, or congregate in one location because we find comfort and acceptance in each other, because we know that we each understand to a greater or lesser degree the issues faced by others nearby. We don't expect that this safety will be shattered by a bomb.

Clearly, we're wrong.

While we (collectively) shout about wanting to be accepted as equals to straights, to have the same rights and entitlements as them, we have yet to convince many in the world that we even have a right to exist. The privileged gays and lesbians of "the West", are so myopic in the struggle for equal rights with hets—the right to be married, the right to claim dependents, the right to spousal benefits—that we miss the horrific loathing that still seethes in some people. Loathing that makes it still all right to kill people, because we're 'less than human' anyway.

To change that loathing will take years and years. In India it's illegal to be homosexual; in parts of the Middle East men and women can be executed for engaging in homosexual sexual acts. Even in the United Sates to this day, sodomy laws can dictate punishments of years in prison.

So while we struggle to gain even more privilege, we need to remember that privilege and pride won't bring back the lives of those people in England, or Matthew Shepard, or Harvey Milk. We still have that battle to wage and it ain't over.

#### What's a Word's Worth?

Serendipity. Gotta' love it - first the mainstream mags are demanding to know 'Is Feminism Dead?' and then my S/O (one or two decades older than I) confronts me in the kitchen with the question, "What is WITH you and your 30-something laissez faire-all-the-work-has-been-done mentality?" (And, no, the comment was not in any way related to me doing, or not doing, the dishes...) So, it seemed inevitable, in a cosmic kind of way, that one of the more interesting selections featured in the latest issue of The Women's Review of Books sounds like a great title for all those among us who are puzzling over the future (hell, the present) of feminism.

In Letters of Intent: Women Cross the Generations to Talk about Family, Work, Sex, Love and the Future of Feminism, editors Anna Bondoc and Meg Daly, have collected letters written by young feminists to their 'foremothers.' The older women were then invited to respond and this collection is the result.

By the sounds of it, the correspondents came up with letters of varying degrees of interest and profundity. Nevertheless, this sounds like a unique opportunity to listen in on conversations between women as diverse as Judy Blume, Starhawk and Gloria Steinem. Whether or not you actually run out and order a copy at Bolen's or Munro's (this is so new it hasn't hit the shelves here in Victoria), the review by Lisa Marcus in Women's Review of Books is worth reading. Not only does she ask some rather pointed questions about some of the book's underlying premises (her favourite line in the whole book is aquote from Katha Pollitt, 'Since when did sisterhood become mother-daughterhood?') but in general provides thoughtful commentary on the project, the writing, the exchanges and the women who write their "Letters of Intent."

#### **Mystery Lovers!**

Stalking the Goddess Ship

Stalking the Goddess Ship is the second Cal Meredith mystery by local author, Marsha Mildon. Like her first book, Fighting for Air, the novel is set on Vancouver Island and many local spots will be familiar to Victoria readers. Calliope (Cal) Meredith's travels as she pursues the twists and turns of this complex plot take her from a little table at "Jumpin' Java" (where she attends a poetry reading) to the coves, islands and underwater wrecks near Bamfield.

The tightly written plot is made all the more enticing by a spicy love triangle between the key suspect (a University of Victoria professor and expert in underwater archaeology) and the murder victim (another professor's wife). Skillfully navigating the waters of cold water diving and international porno rings, Mildon has crafted a fast-paced story with a satisfying and intriguing ending. Note: The book will be launched at La Run Theatre, 1983 Fairfield Road, June 11 at 7 p.m. No admission charge.

And, here's the blurb from Spinster's Ink about the latest mystery from Val McDermid's pen: Lindsay Gordon is in the thick of it, as usual. Now living in California, she returns to England for a trade union conference and swaps insults the first night with Tom "Union" Jack. When this unethical union boss is found dead early the next morning, having catapulted out of Lindsay's tenth-floor room, she is taken away for questioning by the police. In an effort to clear her name by finding the real killer, Lindsay searches among hundreds of unruly conventioneers for a murderer who may have struck once before.

Finally, the self-described "cynical, socialist, lesbian feminist" ex-journalist uncovers a seething cauldron of blackmail, corruption, and abuse of power, all brought to a boil by her sleuthing! "Lindsay Gordon makes deft work of murders past and present in this thriller with a shock ending that is Everywoman's secret fantasy. Val McDermid knows the way to a woman's heart is through nasty, elegant poetic justice. This one delivers it!"

# **Chiropractic Care and HIV/AIDS**


### **CPOW Powers On**



### M.A.R.S Project Results Releases

Why with all the information out there do gay men persist in having unprotected sex?

The question was more than Stephen Samis. The booklet

and the findings of research was introduced at a press conference for the M.A.R.S Project organized by Aids Vancouver Island and presented at the theatre at St. Ann's Academy.

Men's Attitudes about Relationship and Sexuality are explained in their own words in the pamphlet. Sad words, some, but there's hope offered not only in the integrity of the sharing, but also in the reader's opportunity to relate, to understand, to accept.

The men taking part in the research are not all gay. They are also bi-sexual,

and heterosexual men who have sex with men. The operative shorthand used to define gay sex and sexuality has been MSM or Men having sex with men. As is so often the case, the shorthand doesn't work. Samis and Whyte point out, straight men "have qualitatively different experiences from gay and bisexual men."

The M.A.R.S. project was funded by Prevention Community Action Program and National Research Development Program, Health Canada, Government of Canada and administered through AIDS Vancouver Island in Victoria.

The first block to self-esteem for gay men is the closet. Dwayne, gay, aged 33 reports: "What was excruciating was the self-acceptance. That was the biggest resistance I had...I had a lot of guilt and shame attached to feeling attracted to men. Coming out and learning to accept myself was absolutely liberating and amazing."

Safer sex is, the research proved, linked to men's feelings

about themselves, their personal relationships and the social environments in which they grow up and live. Some men grew up in abusive homes, were abused, abuse drugs and alcohol to overcome feelings of low self-esteem, relax, "go away" from themselves. Having parental acceptance helps but one man reports having a "good gay family around"what we might call family of choice. Social supports are important.

Gay and bi-sexual men want and need to share their stories as gay and bisexual men and not simply in relationship to HIV/AIDS. And, certainly not knowing gay people in youth is counter-productive. One young man heard his parents trying to be liberal, 'some of our best friends are' but "you would

> get the picture that ooh this is not kind of right yet they had close friends." Yet, he, Chuck, now 33, still says in regard to his parents..."I guess I've been lucky." Certainly, having positive gay role models is an important construct of good gay self-esteem.

> Stephen's and Karen's report is a good read for anyone. Sometimes it's heart-wrenching. Those of you who

# Striking a Balance:

### The Place of Politics in the Queer Community

Lawrence Aronovitch wrote about his experiences as a "political" guest at the Victoria Youth Pride Society, the capital's LGBTQ youth group. He concluded that "these young women and men care very deeply about these issues. They're thoughtful about the implications and are moved to do something about it. They just don't want to use the "p" word to describe it."

In my work with Victoria's queer community, both with VYPS and previously as Acting Chair and Outreach Coordinator of UVic's Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual Alliance, I struggle with the "p" word constantly. Clearly, there were many, many issues in the community and in society that required a political response. But the very thought of politics was scary, particularly at UVic where I personally watched the LGBA collapse amid political turmoil at the very moment when I needed it the most, as I myself was coming out.

When I joined the LGBA board in March 1997, my colleagues and I decided that we were going to take the organisation in a new direction. We would move away from "politics" and become more relevant to the issues of real students. At least, that was the theory, and it sure sounded good after a year of apparently endless "political" struggles.

In practice, this meant expanding support programs, converting a sterile office into a comfortable drop-in centre, and finding new ways of getting the word out to queer students on campus. Over six months, we transformed ourselves and the organisation, and the effects of that transformation are still visible two years later (though many don't recall it being any other way).

But the problem remained. The LGBA continued to be seen as a "political" group. It had a reputation for loud protests, noisy marches and ag-

gressive tactics. Even the campus press saw us as obnoxious and unproductive. This was a perception, and an erroneous one at that. The LGBA had always done much more than noisy protests. Even with our focus changed, the perception lingered. As time went on, it became clear that this reputation was hurting our ability to reach out to the campus. The perception, regardless of reality, made us unable to be there for students who needed a group like the LGBA (first year university is still prime coming out time).

But as much as it hurt, it was that same political action that made the LGBA what it was. Without that action, the LGBA wouldn't have space, status, or funding. Without that action, queer issues wouldn't have the profile they do today and UVic wouldn't have become one of the more queer-friendly campuses in the nation. We were faced with the harsh reality that the LGBA needed politics, even if its members didn't. We needed to find appropriate political forums where the LGBA could actually make a difference, and we needed to find a way to keep a separation between our political role and our social/support role. With this in mind, we embarked on what I called "a new kind of politics" that year. Gone were the rallies and sit-ins with bullhorns and banner-waving. They had a place, but UVic in 1997 wasn't it. We replaced the clenched fists of protest with the open arms of anti-homophobia speaking, residence outreach, and rational dialogue for change.

In a sense, we had abandoned vocal, radical politics not because they were ineffective (they certainly still had a place), but because they created a perception that rendered the entire organisation ineffective in fulfilling our primary mandate: to improve the lives of queer students at UVic.

In my last speech as Acting Chair, I summarised it thus: "we're not out to change the world anymore, but as long as we continue to improve the worlds of individual students, staff, and faculty, we've done our job." In hindsight, we were helping change the world, even though I didn't realise or admit it at the time.

Not everyone agreed with our approach. Students' society officials warned that "we won't fund a social club." Past board members described us variously as "lazy," "cowardly," and "useless." Perhaps we were, in some eyes. Discussion revealed two distinctly different views of the LGBA: those of us who believed that it should be open and welcoming to all queer students, and those who saw the LGBA as a much smaller group of committed activists ostensibly acting on behalf of the silent masses. My position was clear: "I won't sell out our membership for politics." But the dilemma remained.

Two years later, the question of politics in queer organisations still lingers. Today, I work with the Victoria Youth Pride Society, an organisation that does not claim or desire to have any political function whatsoever. But when you really look at it, many of the things we do are definitely political: Anti-homophobia outreach in schools. Speaking out on queer youth issues. Even the visibility of our very existence. But we still don't want to call that existence political.

Why not, I often ask myself. Because the perception of politics is scary, particularly to those just coming out. We must walk that tightrope, and balance the competing interests of the need to engage in some politics, versus the need to maintain an atmosphere that is open and welcoming to those who need us most. Do we succeed in maintaining that balance? It all depends on your politics.

# Marsha Launches Goddess Ship

When I caught up with Marsha Mildon at Bean Around the World, one of her favourite coffee haunts, it was easy to see that the 'fame and fortune' of having a second mystery novel published had not gone to her head. In fact, her head was almost hidden under a too-big ersatz Tilley hat that announced Golden Retrievers are Great. Along with the paw prints on her jeans, I concluded that her dogs and cats are still her first love; humans and writing mysteries coming a close second.

Stalking the Goddess Ship is the second of Marsha's Cal Meredith mysteries, published by New Victoria Publishers. In the first, Fighting for Air, we met Cal Meredith, a private investigator based in Victoria, and follow her investigation of a scuba student's death and her budding


love affair with Jay Campbell, the scuba instructor. In Stalking the Goddess Ship, Cal and Jay have just returned from abrief holiday in Crete where they had immersed themselves in goddess archeology, and unwittingly, archeological politics. Back on Vancouver Island, Jay heads to Bamfield to assist a friend with a scuba resort. When they discover the wife of a local archeology prof chained to an old shipwreck, Cal finds herself pulled reluctantly into investigating the murder, and the lives of more acquaintances than she ever wanted to know.

When I asked Marsha why she chose mystery novels as the genre to write in, she chuckled as she pronounced, "Write what you know—the first rule for beginning writers, isn't it?"

"But you haven't murdered anyone have you?" asked your intrepid reporter.

"No. It turns out I'm not very good at it. I always botch the job," she smiled as if discussing cooking. "But what fascinates me is that every one of us has all the potential necessary for good, evil, and the whole spectrum in between. What I want to know is what exactly tips otherwise 'normal' human beings over that edge where they can consciously kill another human being.

"Crimes done in the very height of passion aren't as interesting. The murderer is barely aware of what she's doing. And so far, serial killers seem too far off the scale—pure goodness or pure evil bores me. It's the woman or man who's 'just like me' until one day some irreversible switch goes



off, and they break the primal taboo against killing one's own species. Those are the characters I want to explore—along with their friends, enemies, victims, and the parts the whole community plays in the tragedies."

And what about the role of the goddesses in this 'Goddess Ship'? Are you a believer in goddesses?"

"I'm not sure I'm a 'believer' in anything—more like an explorer of everything. I find the notion of societies in which the female aspect of humanness is in the ascendant incredibly attractive—as are the goddess figures themselves. As Cal says, 'it was only after seeing the Willendorf goddess that I was able to begin liking my own body.' As for the goddesses in this novel, let's just say they stand

at one end of the spectrum of the female."

When not puzzling over the intricacies of human character, Marsha publishes a magazine, *V.I.Pets*, for the dog and cat set on the island, and edits a magazine, LawNow, about law for the general public. "I'm really in the 'family' business," she says. "My dad became a probation officer when I was seven, and from then on, law and crime were the main topics of dinner conversation."

When I asked if she was working on a third Cal Meredith mystery, Marsha frowned. "I have an idea for one and I've written some chapters, but at the moment the whole thing seems overwhelmingly dark. And it has a twisted element of the classic British whodunit where the characters are all locked up together for the duration of the novel. So it has the possibility of being both black and passive—not a good recipe for a dynamic plot.


"Right now, I feel more like I'd like to write something slightly humourous—delving for the years of a novel into the dark side of humanity is not always good for one's own state of mind. So who knows what will come next? Except for sure, there'll be a bit of champagne for *Stalking the Goddess Ship*, and then some R & R to recharge my creative batteries."

# Quotes & Queeries: News & views from the lesbian & gay press, and queer cyberspace

Bruce Bagemihl, author of a new book Biological Exuberance, has sparked a debate among scientists with his research on the homosexual side of nature.



Time magazine staffer Jeffrey Kluger (April 26, 1999) reports that Bagemihl documents same-sex pairings in more than 450 different species and evidence of long-term relationships.

Responding to critics, Bagemihl argues that since homosexuality comes naturally to other creatures, perhaps it's time to quit getting into a lather over the fact that it comes naturally to humans too. He believes that political questions are beside the point: "We shouldn't have to look to the animal world to see what's normal or ethical. Indeed, when it comes to answering those questions, Mother Nature seems to be keeping an open mind."

Sharon Stone and Ellen DeGeneres will star in and produce If These Walls Could Talk 2, a trilogy about the lesbian experience in America. An HBO premier, Walls 2 has also signed Anne Heche, who directed an episode of the original Walls (three stories about abortion) broadcast in 1996. She will direct Stone and DeGeneres in a segment entitled Miss Conception which presents a contemporary lesbian couple's experience conceiving a child.

Ellen (again) has bounced back to stardom in an ironic bit of casting in the film EDtv — in which she plays a cable network executive who seizes on the idea of making a regular guy named Ed into a TV personality. Interviewed on CNN, Ellen declares "life is good" in all respects: "We live in a small town just a few hours out of Los Angeles, in the mountains, and have a farm and animals and kind of balance out coming into Los Angeles every few weeks for business... I used to live that way in high school. I lived in a small town and liked knowing everybody and waving when you drive down the street."

Word is that Ellen and Anne recently exchanged gold wed-

ding rings, each engraved inside with the word "wife." Now, don' cha just wonder how I know that you care?!

Dena (surname unknown) of the St. Louis Pride committee is calling on the community to support Anheuser-Busch (Bud Light) for its groundbreaking ad depicting two men holding hands and the slogan, "Be yourself and make it Bud Light." Predictably, the brewer—one of several key corporate sponsors for the upcoming St. Louis festival—is feeling the heat from homophobes. A national campaign is underway to transform St. Louis Pridefest into a "destination of choice" for the lesbigay community. Organizers have pulled together an all-star entertainment lineup and impressive guest speakers, including author Armistead Maupin and Leslie Sadasivan, who became an advocate for P-Flag after her gay son committed suicide at the tender age of 14. "Her appearance adds relevance and a reminder of what Pridefest is

> about," said a festival spokesman. "This is not just a party, but a time, place and state of mind for everyone to feel safe and confident in who they are. It is about community."

Paul Cameron, a right-wing Christian fundamentalist

Paul Cameron, a right-wing Christian psychologist, seems to have a serious case of same-

sex envy. He told Rolling Stone magazine that he fears gay sex will supplant heterosexual sex unless a vigilant society represses it. Homosexuality, he said, "seems too powerful to resist." Cameron appears to have done his homework: "Marital sex tends toward the boring," he explained. "Generally, it doesn't deliver the kind of sheer sexual pleasure that homosexual sex does... The evidence is that men do a better job on men, and women on women." Is it any wonder we recruit? (Cont'd page 11)

Maxine Wolfe vowed to herself that this spring's rally in New York City would not be a repeat of past protests against police brutality, in which lesbigay involvement went unnoticed. This time, says the longtime activist with ACT UP and the Lesbian Avengers, she would be visible as a lesbian: "So we got some red satin material and put across it, ŒLesbians against police brutality., A lot of people [made banners]." Visibility was enhanced by the work of Maura Keaney, chief of staff for a lesbian NYC council member, who co-ordinated efforts by local gay organizations to reach out to the community. Police estimated that 4,500 people protested the shooting death of African immigrant Amadou Diallo by four police officers. Organizers put the number at 25,000.


A dramatic dance piece by Carolina

For those of you who "danced 'til you dropped" at the Spring Fling in March, you know what kind of a show Valu 1 Productions puts on.


#### What is Valu 1 Productions?

### Legal Eagle Spells it Out for Dykes & Gays

If you plan on getting married, cohabiting, being a spouse, finding a spouse, or settling down in a marriagelike relationship the first thing you better do is grab a pen and paper and a lawyer might be a good idea too. Lawyer Alison Campbell couldn't have been plainer as she warned of the aspects of the law in this province that can help or hinder how we conduct the legal aspects of our partnerships—and protect one another.

Write a will. Get a will written. Find a lawyer or a piece of paper now, if you are in partnership and want your estate to go where you want it to go. Speaking primarily to lesbians attending the legal workshop in a series sponsored by Victoria Lesbian Seniors Care Society, Alison urged this "legally recognized piece of paper" be a priority to protect you and your relationship. "If you have a will, you forego government interference," she emphasized.

The Estate Administration Act does not include the definition of spouse as applied to same sex couples. If it isn't spelled out in your will, she told us your estate will go to your children, parents, brothers or sisters. And your poor partner has no say. The legislation in B.C. is in the forefront in adoption legislation and allows for lesbian partnerships to both be seen fully as parents. The Family Relations Act was changed to redefine spouse as persons living in a married-like relationship for two years. For purposes of this Act, spouse can be same gender. If application for support is made within one year of dissolution of the partnership, we can apply for spousal support. Under parts five and six of the Act, which deal with division of property, common law and same sex spouses do not qualify. Those two parts only apply to legally married people. A common-law or same-sex couple who have an agreement regarding property, must use the courts. A judge can use the provisions in five and sex to review the fairness of the agreement.

#### **Division of Pensions**

We have no access to pensions federally. We do have access to our spouse's provincial government pension plan if we are designated as "spouse". We all remember the Egan-Nesbitt application for change to the law. While Egan and Nesbitt can't claim one another's pension, the Supreme Court did rule that there was discrimination. A door is open. But we can't yet walk through.

#### Property e.g. house

If you are buying property together, the commitment financially is seldom equal. Whether equal or not, buying or not, you or your significant other may be seen in the law as tenant, border, or joint owner depending on the way you have put together your paper work. Even if your SO is not on title she/he may claim part ownership in the property by way of constructive trust. To avoid all this multitude of pitfalls, Alison recommends documenting everything in writing.

If you own your home as joint tenants then upon the death of one tenant the other tenant automatically owns the whole home.

Keep Records. Redo wills within two months of signing a partnership agreement. Every piece of paper should be tight, written in clear, plain language that can't be interpreted in different ways. There is a danger of misinterpretation if you write your own agreements, or if you don't have them looked over by a person with some experience of the law, like a lawyer. Also, the person looking it over may raise issues you've left out, Alison told us.

Judges interpret. There is less homophobia on the bench. But it is still there, she warned us.

Bring your best selves to the writing of the agreement. If a child is involved be aware of the Wills Variation Act. Definition of spouse here is accessible only to legally married spouses and biological children. If a person who has


children who don't need their assets and wants to write those children out of the will, those children can go to court and rightfully demand what assets your partner was expecting. It is a good idea to leave children something to avoid resentment and any court tie-ups.

A holograph will is no good in BC. A will must be witnessed by two people at the same time and those people must in no way be connected to the will.

Power of Attorney is a document that let's one person act for another in any area the other person would normally act for herself. There's an enduring Power of Attorney that continues even if the person who gave it becomes mentally incompetent.

A *limited* power of attorney is confined to the purpose for which the power was given. For example one might have Power of Attorney for the purpose of selling the house and dealing with land registry. However, once the house sale is complete, Power of Attorney is dissolved.

You can revoke a Power of Attorney by writing to the person to whom you gave it and to any financial institution where it has been used. A power of attorney form is very simple it is a prescribed form under the Act.

# Coffee with Gerald Walton: What Is Community

Rowan Percy was right. Community is "more like an abstract concept". As she says, in the April Rhino, the tricky thing is that "community" is a concept.. an expression of its constituents.

Gerald Walton rightly called me on my comments, made all over the place, regarding men's community and my perception that there isn't one. Gerald and I met for coffee to talk about men and he surprised me right away by saying he doesn't subscribe to the identity of man. Okay. Why?

"I learned through sociology, women's studies, gender and sexuality studies what 'man' meant. I don't want to be what I am not. I have never been comfortable with the term 'man'.

"Some gay men come from the perspective of reclaiming masculinity as a political act. When does it become an attempt to reclaim rather than merely subscribe to the gender ideology?," he went on. "So I see two things happening—gay men are trying to adopt the masculine thing, but on the other hand, it's not cool cause it perpetuates the gender standard."

Hunh?

"It's about the whole macho thing. Rigid standards of muscle, denying emotion and a fear of appearing to be feminine. Gay men are taught to feel bad about that."

Oh, so you flaunt to affirm?, I asked. "Why not? It has taken years to be okay with my gender as opposed to my sexuality. I've never heard anybody say

is it okay to be a man? On the other hand there is a kind of tyranny about growing up as a boy who can't cry—otherwise I'm a sissy. Eventually, I stopped being everything I'm 'supposed to be'. It's a lot of crap!!! When I made the decision I'm going to be as I am, not what everybody else says I should be, my life improved dramatically."

# Gerald surprised me right away by saying he doesn't subscribe to the identity of man.

"My very outness is a political act. I came out while I was studying sociology, women's studies and gender and sexuality courses. My acting as a gay man who has the same rights as heterosexuals do, that is a political act. What I've tried to do is manifest political living. Politics is more than Pride Parade, more than legal fights, although they're important. So is living as if, visibility, flaunting it without reacting to accusations of flaunting it.

There was a period of time when Gerald was uncomfortable, even more uncomfortable perhaps, with his sexuality. He got involved with Fundamentalist Christianity and became one of the Ex-Gays. While initially he found the experience "quite euphoric" Gerald

went through a lot of hell.

"They [church] tell you this is how you can be healed. Its a gradual process. They blame the choice on child-hood, my not growing up with a dad I was close to, no peers, no relationship. It mis-aligned my gender, they said. And a homosexual attraction is one manifestation of that [growing up time]."

Gerald's anger at all that society has said about him as a homosexual gave fuel to a united campaign to thwart Karey Simpson's mission when she visited Victoria. Gerald had been invited by his P-LAG-member sister to a public forum in Courtenay. In Courtenay the idea was to inform people about Simpson and her message. Here, thanks to Gerald's efforts, the reverse was true. Simpson gave a different presentation here than she probably intended and it was Gerald's awareness of her doctrine of hate toward homosexuals and lesbians that lead him to call Monday and tell them to alert the community she was coming. He also personally alerted a number of key people here and -well, we know what happened. We now have the Island Rainbow-our own political activist group. Gerald didn't foresee that kind of result, but: "I sent her [Simpson] a thank-you note. She didn't respond."

Gerald has harsh words for anyone who wants to "heal" us. "How many people come from a terrible back (Cont'd page 17)

ground because of Christianity. On the other hand I really do believe gays and lesbians as Christians have a powerful potential to undermine the Christian Right."

Well, so far we have seen Gerald as a political activist. And we saw a lot of gay men at the Karey Simpson event. Let's go to more on 'community.'

I start with the overall and ask Gerald about a gay and lesbian centre. He endorsed the idea but he wasn't sure it make much difference in his life personally. "It might have been vital when I first moved here. It would give accessibility to new people. How do you access community if you are a new gay in town?

"I used to envy the lesbians on campus. They are more easy to access. Part of my success has been accidental. Some people advertise for a social group which I never had to do."

It seems to be a bit like a trickle-

down. Talk to one, who introduces you to another. Well, there is gaydar to get you guys started, I am thinking.

Gerald, like a lot of lesbians I know, is interested in challenging the status quo on a lot of issues. Relationship is one thing. Monogamy as we have noticed by the divorce rate in the heterosexual community, doesn't work for everyone. Gerald found in his own long-distance and open relationship with Aaron he could challenge the expectation of monogamy.

"I think it becomes a social institution and an expectation. There's a lot of assumptions i.e. monogamy equals trust; non-monogamy doesn't. There is a distinction between sexual monogamy and emotional monogamy. I think what I am talking about is changing social attitude. Life-long monogamy is really eroded—apply it to gay, straight, bi, tran. Fewer people are subscribing to what it means to be a man. Women's studies helped me to establish a voice. I'm not willing to be

a gay version of what we call a man. I model a kind of openness."

None of what Gerald has experienced does he regard as a waste of time. He still calls himself a spiritual person and his past has shown him what he doesn't want and what is dangerous. His eagerness to share his experience is also politics in the finest sense of the phrase—and the way we dykes use the term—as ideal social organization.

Gerald finishes up his Masters degree this year and he hopes to work with Ministry of Education in the area of Human Rights.

We talked for much longer than I intended. We had "community" in a coffee shop in Oak Bay—well, one kind of community. It was neat. Let's do it again, all over the place—in groups of twos and threes, lesbian couples, gay couples, gay and lesbian couples, gay, lesbian and tranny couples, bi-couples. The thing is: let's keep talking. Who knows what grand kind of Community will come of it all.

#### The Bakerwench Makes Friends With Herbie

So spring has finally arrived, hooray! Yes, you can feel it in the way the blossoms coat the driveway, the mind boggling number of garage sales per neighborhood, and in the way our hormones are raging rather uncontrollably. I say "Put that sexual energy to use." But if no one grabs your fancy, than the next best thing is..... grow herbs!

No, really. Many a happy moment has been spent skipping gaily (its the only way) through my herb garden, snipping and sniffing, tra-la-la. OK maybe that's taking it a bit far, but really, nothing can make a meal come more alive than fresh herbs.

Now you might think you'd have to be a master gardener as well as chef to grow fine herbs, but this is simply not true. Herbs are one of the happiest plants, and providing they are planted in the right location, will give lovingly for years to come. Everyone has their favourites. For example, if you're a meat and potatoes kind you might be partial to rosemary, sage and chive. Whereas a swinging west-coast granola chick or guy might prefer cilantro, lemon-grass and garlic. Me, I'll take 'em all, morning, noon and night. Big or small, old or young, they're all yummy to me.

So, I know you are all screaming, "Where do I sign up?" Well, as it is spring, there can be no better time. First off, I suggest that you visit your local nursery and find yourself some lovely specimens. Be sure to pay heed to their particular light and liquid requirements and fertilise often. Keep in mind that most plants tend to put out more shoots once trimmed, so do not be afraid to

snip all through the season, you are doing yourself and the plant a favour. Another thing to keep in mind is whether it is r prized basil to return next year, whereas mint is so invasive you could easily have a garden full of it in a few years if left unattended.

I shall pass on to you a favourite recipe that will make your tastebuds do cartwheels and your soul vibrate at a higher frequency. If the aforementioned doesn't happen, than maybe it is best to put your sexual energies where they belong, and come back to the herbs when spring is over. Happy herbing!

#### Roasties:

- 2 lb. small red potatoes
- 2-3 tbsp. sunflower or olive oil
- 2 tbsp. fresh rosemary leaves, picked from stem
- whole garlic cloves, skinned salt and pepper to taste

1/3 cup of chopped nuts (optional)

Preheat oven to 450F. Cut potatoes into large pieces of equal size. Toss in oil to coat, adding as is necessary. Place into roasting pan in an even layer. Season with salt and pepper and sprinkle with rosemary. Roast for 10 minutes. Remove from oven, turn gently adding garlic cloves. Return to oven for 30 minutes turning as necessary. If adding nuts, add 5 minutes before the end of cooking. Potatoes are done when crisp and golden.

#### Salad:

4 large handfuls of mixed salad greens (bibb, endive, chicory, red oak leaf, romaine)

1/2 cup of loosely chopped fresh herbs (thyme, mint, basil, chive, lovage)

1 handful of mixed adible flower heads

1 handful of mixed edible flower heads (pansies, violas, nasturtiums)

8-12 sprigs of herb of your choice for decoration (chive, mint, cilantro, parsley, dill)

\* looks best if the herbs for decoration are flowering.

#### **Dressing:**

4 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil

1 tbsp. balsamic vinegar

1/2 clove of garlic, minced

1 tsp. Dijon mustard pinch sugar

salt and pepper to taste.

Just before service toss the greens, herbs and flowers in bowl. Shake dressing in lidded jar and pour over salad. Toss well and divide among individual bowls. Decorate with herb sprigs and serve immediately.

### **ALTA Moving to Co-Adoptions**

Ed Note: In the November 1988 edition of LNews (the Rhino's forerunner) we ran a story about Susan and Penni who were trying to adopt a child. My friends Peggy and Michele have written to tell me of the successful adoption of their baby Kira. They are going to tribunal in the fall to make sure that both names are on the birth certificate when their second child is born. Peggy and Michele have moved to Banff since that time. What happens anywhere in this country has an affect on us all. Our support, our prayers, our affirmations, our rituals, our vocals—all are necessary to ensure equal rights equally in this marvelously regional country.

As the Alberta government announces a bill to allow co-adoptions to same-gender non-bio co-parents, a right-wing group races to oppose a pending suit that could force an even broader law.

Alberta's Social Services Minister Lyle Oberg announced April 21 the Conservative government will soon be introducing legislation to open secondparent adoptions to same-gender partners, a significant step in the recognition of gay and lesbian couples. Currently, non-biological parents in unmarried heterosexual relationships can co-adopt their partners' children, but those in gay and lesbian couples cannot.

Oberg says the new bill will simply substitute 'step-parent' for 'spouse' in the section of the existing Child Wel-

couples who have thus far been denied co-adoptions. Oberg an-



nounced that the Alberta government is ready to drop its defense against this lawsuit, but a right-wing group is seeking standing to take over the defense at government expense. Oberg's announcement represents still more follow-up to last month's Tory caucus meeting on gay and lesbian issues, as the provincial government struggles to find balance between conservative values and last year's Canadian Supreme Court ruling in the case of Delwin Vriend, which forced Alberta to recognize the civil rights of gays and lesbians. He called the extension of stepparent adoptions 'consistent' with the caucus discussion, emphasizing that what the provincial government wants to do is remove itself from private matters as much as possible.

However, the government is moving one step at a time, while some 60 provincial laws use the same exclusively heterosexual definition of spouse' as the Child Welfare Act does. Oberg's first move in the wake of the caucus meeting had been to loosen the ban on gays and lesbians providing foster care, but




Two Moms and a Baby Peggy Maher (back), Michele Gill and baby Kira

he insisted on instituting a special written justification for his personal review for each such placement.

Oberg's latest announcement indicated that the only limitations on coadoptions would be that they would not apply to children who are wards of the state, and that they can be rejected by a child over 12 or by a child's guardian.

As for the co-adoption lawsuit, the couples' attorney confirmed for the Edmonton Journal on April 21 that the government had agreed to withdraw, but that the Alberta Federation of Women United for Families is seeking a Calgary court's permission to defend against the challenge. If, as seems likely, the lawsuit proceeds before the new legislation has been adopted, the group fears that without opposition, the judgment against the Child Welfare Act could be so broad as to limit the legislature's options for future laws. The law firm currently representing the Federation is offering itself as an alternate defender of the law, should the court find the Federation not 'independent' enough to present an opposing position on behalf of the public.






