Though you can spot small solar panels on streetlights, garden fountains, traffic signs & emergency phones, NYC needs more solar energy, wind turbines, fuel cells & other new sources of clean, renewable energy.
Wondering how our electricity is generated? In 1999, we used 10% residual oil, 17% coal, 22% nuclear, 30% natural gas & 20% hydro power to keep downtown bright. Each source has negative environmental and health impacts, and costs are spiraling up. It's easy to start conserving & using less every day:
♦ Turn off lights, computers, TVs, ACs, etc. when not in use.
♦ Invest in the future with compact fluorescent light bulbs and save up to \$80 in!
♦ Put on a sweater, don't turn up the heat!
♦ On summer days, close the curtains when the hot sun is beaming in.


