


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PRIME TIME GOES NATIONAL (on television that is....)

We are presently involved in the production of a television program for CBC Access to be shown at 4pm on July 29th. This half hour film will be made here in Victoria during the first week of July, "on location" at the Prime Time office for the most part. Focus will be on issues relevant to mid-life women rather than Prime Time per se, and we are in the process of contacting various Prime Time women who may be willing to be in the film. Prime Time will have a copy of the program on cassette after the program is shown, and we will then be able to use it to show other groups and community services.



## INTRODUCING OUR THREE SUMMER GRANT RESEARCHERS

Three summer grant researchers are hired and have been hard at work since May 28. We are delighted to welcome these three mid-life women to our staff: 1) Dawn Morrow is co-ordinating the production and distribution of our Information Kit. She has a family, returned to school to complete her B.A. approximately eight years ago, and this December completed her M.A. in English. Her work experience has ranged from nursing, Montessori School teacher, architect office work, to editing of academic journals. 2) Sue Mouat has been hired to design, administer and tabulate the follow-up survey of participants in selected Prime Time programs. She lives on Salt Spring, has a family, a background in nursing and much community work; and at 56 has just been accepted for her third year at the U. Vic. School of Social Work. 3) Thelma Raymond is to prepare a written statement which gives an overview of those social policies affecting women in mid-years. She will also assist in the design phase of the survey, and until mid-July will be helping prepare the script for the CBC Access television program. Thelma has a B.A. and B.Ed.; has had drama and stage management experience in England; headed a high school English department and taught English, Sociology, Drama and German. She has two grown children, has recently moved to Victoria, has been taking courses at U. Vic. in preparation for an M.A. in counselling which she intends to begin in September.

## INFORMATION KIT

Prime Time is in the process of making an Information Kit which will be distributed to women's groups, community agencies, libraries and resource centres -- locally, provincially and perhaps federally. It will contain much of our collected information put into a functional format of use to others: resource booklets on program informational needs of women in mid-life, pamphlets on issues of concerns, a complete bibliography, and a booklet containing a synopsis of our original research data on women in mid-years, a compilation of profiles of women in mid-life, and various articles on Prime Time as a project. Plans for its distribution are being made, which will hopefully take place in the fall. We will also have copies available in our library.



SUMMER STUDENT RESEARCH PROJECT or.... Be on the lookout for another Prime Time questionnaire

Many of you have very kindly filled out various Prime Time questionnaires and course evaluations. These have been very useful for program planning, and for our own original collection of information about women from women. As you are aware, we close our doors in March 1980. During this last year we are concerned with finalizing our data, and also attempting to measure in various ways the impact Prime Time has had in the community. We would like to compare the information we received from you in our first year and a half of operation with data collected now. Your perceptions of needs and the value and influence of particular programs may be different now and possibly even more objective. Therefore by early July, we will be sending out a questionnaire to all those who have participated in a Prime Time program/workshop/course etc. The data collected and analyzed will be included with our previous data, and it will all form a part of a printed booklet in our total Information Kit. We foresee this information to be of value to community service agencies and educational institutions. We will appreciate your support of this final survey.

## THE PERSON'S PROJECT

The Person's Project is a student summer research programme, funded by the Secretary of State, which is organizing activities for October, 1979 to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of women achieving the status of persons under the law.

The project is trying to research and collect photographs and biographical ANOW and anecdotal information about the following women who were involved in the suffrage and women's rights movement and the political life of B.C. and particularly Victoria: Mrs. J.W. de B. Farris, Mrs. Margaret Clay, Mrs. Mabel Penery French, Mrs. Gordon Grant, Helena Gutteridge, Edith Paterson, H.E. Young, Mrs. Laura Jamieson, Margaret Jenkins, Celia McNaughton Spofford and the Hon, Cairine Wilson.

exciting and frustrating age to be. To look back at my teenage ms and hopes and look now at the reality of today is a bit shattering tif I didn't reach any of my goals I feel some satisfaction with the kind of person I've become and some of the things I've done.

What happened to the 13 year old "libber" who fought at school and home for "equal rights"? The expectations of the day were "secretary" and "wife and mother". Because of family pressures and lack of money, university was out of the question - so it was an early marriage and a Civil Service job. Gone were plans for journalism or perhaps a career in radio (how can I reconcile the dauntless public speaker at 16 and the shy 43 year old?). The kid who swore she would never get stuck in some office typing all day has spent most of her working years doing just that.

An early marriage that failed and years in secretarial work that I didn't like. Then some time living on my own which gave me a good sense of independence and practice in self reliance. I knew I could cope. That stood

I knew I could cope. That stood me in good stead for my move across the country, a new job, a new marriage and children. What a shock for me to discover I almost couldn't cope with being at home with two babies, and with a husband whose job meant he was almost never home to help, and with not enough money to go around. This was a low point in my life -- there seemed no place, no time for me.

Back to work part-time and then full time as the children started to school.

I feel a strong bond with all working mothers who must also carry most of the load of raising the children and running the house. It is punishing year after year and harder as you get older. Resentment is bound to build up when you find your needs still not anywhere near the top of the list. I love my family and have now decided that I must, for a few more years, spend more time at home, but wonder if by that time I'll know what to do -- what choices to make for me.

I am a walking split - wanting two worlds: a strong family life and a career for me, where I can have a sense of commitment and accomplishment. I know there are many women struggling like me, but it is still a lonely place to be.

P.S. If there is one thing that will bring tears to my eyes, it's to see a father caring for his children like a mother. How much easier it all would be if both parents could share fully the parenting.

## MARK YOUR CALENDARS .....

Prime Time is currently involved in the planning of two important public forums. The first will be held in October and is called Bread and Roses - a course in financial consciousness raising...legal and financial management of your own life. The course hopes to reduce the mystique of money-management for women and to increase awareness and competency in legal and financial matters. As well, it will provide information on the historical, financial, emotional and economic implications and some and money.

The course is co-ordinated by the National Association of Women and the Law and Prime Time.

The second forum will be in the form of a conference to be held in February 1980 at the University of Victoria. The planning committee for this conference consists of Prime Time and representatives of the conselling services dept., Schools of Social Work and Nursing and the extension division of the University. This will be Prime Times wind-up public forum on women in middle years. A well known keynote speaker will lauch the two day conference and we anticipate many helpful workshops for both laypeople and professionals.
