The 1993/94 Resource Guide lists hundreds of organizations and agencies that seek to establish equitable sentencing laws and humane conditions of confinement and provide a wide variety of services for prisoners and their families. Also in the guide are state and federal listings for the courts, the legislature and the executive branch.

Before you begin leafing through these pages, a few points

should be made about the guide.

While the PRU supports any and all efforts to assist prisoners and their families, no organization included in this guide has an individual endorsement by the PRU, nor does an excluded organization have our disapproval.

The section headings are imperfect. You may not find a listing under the heading that you believe to be most appropriate. This is one of many good reasons to familiarize yourself with the entire guide. Also, an index has been added to assist you in finding

specific listings.

Each section lists both prisoner and parolee services. You must read each listing to determine which organizations are currently valuable to you and which will be valuable down the road. There is, however, a section specifically designed for parolees. While most of these listings serve only the parolee population, I encourage all prisoners to read through those pages long before paroling in order to formulate release plans and make contacts.

Lastly, while this guide is by no means complete, it is an excellent beginning. Prisoners, use this guide to supplement other sources for information and advice (counselors, law library, etc.). You must create your own support network both for the time you serveand, perhaps more importantly, for your release. Firm up your parole plans. Do not hesitate to write organizations that may be of assistance. Successful reintegration into the community will demand considerable effort.
