TO NGO OR NOT TO...

Despite Chinese Attitudes, NGO (non-governmental organizations) is A Go! August 30 - September 8, 1995.

By now the obstacles thrown up by the Chinese government to prevent and discourage participation at this historic meeting will have been played out, and the NGO Forum will be under way. The number of women attending will undoubtedly be many fewer than the 36,000 registered by the April 30 deadline, and we can expect that the Forum itself will be disrupted and coloured by the host country's


efforts to sabotage the event. Even so, huge numbers of women, including thousands of lesbians, will, hopefully, have found their way through the bureaucratic jungle, and made their way to the 'scenic tourist site' of Huairou (pronounced "hwhy-roe").

Despite what are described as 'all out' efforts by the Chinese to provide the necessary facilities,

the largest meeting site at the Forum site holds just over 1,500 women. Thus the majority of conference participants will be travelling up to 60 kms from Beijing each day because of insufficient local accommodation. The solution to the inadequate space, according to the Chinese Organizing Committee, is that women who can't get into the meeting sites go sightseeing instead. This latest insult to women is puzzling, as the Chinese Government is issuing 25-day 'business' visas for Forum attendants; women who want to see some of China have been told that they will have to apply for a tourist visa from outside the country after the Forum. Just how many women will obtain any kind of visa is the latest uncertainty, as Chinese Embassies around the world are stalling on issuing visas. Women must first produce an official accommodation confirmation from Beijing, and no one I know who is planning to attend had received theirs as of early August. Women from Tibet are unlikely to be granted a visa, regardless of promises made or forms produced.

Lesbian Activities at the NGO Forum

A listing of 3500-plus workshops and other events at the NGO Forum includes just 24 lesbian-focussed activities (although a number of other events may well include information on lesbians). Topics include lesbian health, lesbians and human rights, international strategizing/organizing, the lesbian movement in Asia, lesbians in the Baltics, sperm donation, legal partnerships, young lesbians, bisexual women, and of course the inevitable Lesbian Issues 101 -'Coming Out'. The single Canadian listing is a workshop entitled 'Flirtation Techniques', offered by Toronto's Nightwood Theatre. Not surprisingly, and indicative of the



heavily-weighted western/ North American Forum content, eleven of the 24 activities are sponsored by U.S.based groups; other countries represented include Estonia, Sweden, Norway, the Netherlands, Serbia, South Africa and Thailand.

In addition to pre-planned activities, there will undoubtedly be many other sponta-

neously-organized activities for lesbians wanting to network and share information.

United Nations Conference

The NGO Forum is being held in conjunction with the UN 4th World Conference on Women. The UN Conference, which brings UN-member governments together, will be adopting national strategies for improving the status of women based on a 'Platform for Action' which has been developed at regional meetings over the past couple of years. The Platform is weak in many key areas, including women's health, the effects of racism, refugees, immigrants, and human rights. Its economic analysis has been described by Vancouver's Shelagh Day as 'so inadequate that it is detrimental to women'. Over a third of the Platform remains 'bracketed', i.e. not yet agreed upon, including statements about the diversity of women, and the discrimination that women experience based on factors such as race, indigenous ancestry, age, ... and sexual orien-

In Svend Robinson's report from Parliament Hill we see that the number of signatures on petitions opposing equal rights for gay men and lesbians presented to parliament so far this session is 71.000. The number in favor. that's us and our friends and acquaintances and those who feel otherwise: 5,386. A friend told me the American-based Focus On The Family group has headquarters in lavish offices in downtown Vancouver with a budget of \$12 million and staff of 2,000. Their principal focus is to eliminate visible homosexuality, lesbianism. They won't admit that. They have been eloquent in print that homosexuals are not "hated" by them. Tell that to any one of us who saw The Advocate with front cover photo of one of Focus' principal leaders bearing a sign saying God hates homosexuals. Then, from Alyson Press's Christianni Sanni, comes word of the new release, The Men With The Pink Triangle. The book proves the existence of the use of the symbol. (I didn't know there was any doubt). The book reminds us of the thousands of comfortably out German homos who were persecuted by the neoconservatives of their day, June 28, 1934 - "The Night of the Long Knives." In 1995 our freedom to be out, in pink cars or not, our rights, our every gains, are all at risk. Without vigilance we are in danger of losing everything. While

the Avengers are doing what they

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do best, the rest of us can consider some 'coalition politics' in the form of joining with the gay guys and our straight friends and supporting the NDP in the next provincial election. No point in forgetting where the Liberals come from. We can get on the phone, sign petitions and get them signed. The more visible we are the harder they are going to fight. In reality they are in the minority. But they are neither invisible nor apathetic. We are. Front page of this month's Angles, we learn Focus On The Family has sufficiently more members on the School Board in the Okanagan, (they dominate the board in Abbotsford, too) to promote an anti-homosexual bias. This board has successfully thwarted Green Thumb Theatre from presenting a show on violence and date rape at Kelowna-area schools. The performance was against the district's locally developed policy on teaching family life. The board policy promotes a family life program that prevents community groups, PWAs and others from speaking about sexuality or family issues in the classroom. Here, Focus On The Family has kept good gay talent from serving on a separate school board.

And ponder a bit, that Disney now owns ABC.

Avoid using these services: Pizza Hut, hired Rush Limbaugh, one of the leading homophobes, to serve as a company spokesperson; Dave Thomas, founder of Wendy's, in his book Well Done, lavishes praise upon homophobe and religious broadcaster Pat Robertson; Liz Claiborne admits her profits support the Ku Klux Klan. Just remember Anita. LesbiaNews was founded September 1988.

Dyke Power

The Lesbian Avengers recruit. The Lesbian Avengers now have a chapter in Victoria.

The Lesbian Avengers was founded in June, 1992, in New York, by six experienced political activists, among them novelist Sarah Schulman. On Gay Pride Day that year, these six womyn handed out 8,000 fluorescent green cards that said: "Lesbians! Dykes! Gay Women! We want revenge and we want it now." Fifty lesbians attended the first meeting. Soon the numbers grew to 500. On October 30, 1992, to honor lesbian Mae Cohens and gay Brian Mock, murdered by skinheads in an Oregon firebombing, Avengers began the tradition of eating fire and chanting "The Fire Will Not Consume Us. We Take It and Make It Our Own."

There are now more than 70 chapters worldwide that come together in the spirit of cooperation, negotiation and flexibility in order to build a community of skilled political organizers committed to action. Each chapter is free to develop its own mandate or purpose. The logo, determined rather violent by some (especially lesbians from war-torn countries) is an ignited bomb. it represents in part, lesbian anger (having a short fuse), it describes lesbians' ability to explode into action and recalls the firebombing of Hattie and Brian.


The Lesbian Avengers is a direct action group using grassroots activism to fight for lesbian survival and visibility. Our purpose is to identify and promote lesbian issues and perspectives while empowering lesbians to become experienced organizers who can participate in political rebellion. Lesbian Avengers activism is a potent mix of the fierce and the fantastic and is fueled by raw, unapologetic rage. We take risks and we are taking back our rights. As a direct action/activism group, the Lesbian Avengers is not for everyone — it is for womyn who want to be involved, make noise, be creative, have fun and take responsibility for their own ideas.

Approximately 20 womyn met for the first Lesbian Avengers meeting here in Victoria (a potluck of course) and the discussion focused on what individual dykes wanted from this group. The majority of womyn liked the style of the Avengers and wanted to be out/loud/in your face and to have fun. Many of us had been political activists for years, and the idea of focusing only on dyke issues struck a cord like coming home. (lesbians have been fighting everyone else's battles for years.) At this point, our mandate is to focus on political action that addresses current events, be active as opposed to re-active only, be articulate and purposeful and stay lesbian only (in other chapters there has been a struggle regarding bisexual womyn -San Francisco has included bisexual womyn while New York is specifically lesbian only) — since only dykes were at this meeting, it is not an issue (yet) for us. I am sure that we will have to revisit this question in the future. Another decision that was made is that we will not eat our own - we will not protest against other dykes. It is a waste of our precious energy while the real enemy gets bigger and


stronger every day (this was a lesson that I personally learned from being in the Vancouver Avengers) and divides us with non-productive infighting.

In case you weren't there (tsk tsk) the Victoria Avengers marshaled the Pride Parade and ate fire for the finale — to let everyone know that we are here! Our next meeting will be in September sometime and plans are in the works for a fund-raising event that no one will want to miss. Dear LesbiaNews:

I want to thank you for including your latest book review, Lesbians in Long Term Recovery, written by Jean Swallow. It arrived at a time in my life when I really needed a reality check. I have been dealing with substance abuse for most of my life and have found myself walking in and out of the doors of AA, NA, Women's Treatment Centre, therapy, relationship after relationship, and to no avail. Why? Because I have refused to allow myself to feel the pain and rage I have bottled up inside me, and medicating myself had become a way of life. I kept thinking it would eventually disappear over time or that I would find that "magical" partner who would understand me and this would change all. Not. I had and still have excuses to continue using, even knowing what I know.

I have realized that as individual as each person is, so is the path to recovery. What is important is not the path you have chosen, but that you have chosen to heal. Being a survivor of child sexual abuse and living with two raging alcoholics who constantly threatened my survival only contributed to my choosing to medicate my pain. As an adult I have spent a good portion of my life blaming and making excuses for my using. I know that I can no longer shift my life responsibility to the past but rather, re-learn how to express my feelings, communicate and accept myself as a loving and worthy person. It is no easy task.

I have been Out in this community for 13 years and have lived with some fairly just and unjust reputations. It has been difficult for me, at times, to continue fighting my denial and remain a part of this community and feel supported. I am writing this letter as a part of that process and to lessen the distance of my own denial.

To those of you who are also dealing with substance or abuse issues, I can only encourage you to continue moving forward, with or without relationship, stay honest, allow yourself to feel the pain and anger, and know that you also are a loving and worthwhile person.



"Not even about the girl?" Rupert pleaded.




"Sounds like you should call the SPCA," she said.


Vancouver Island Lesbians in Progress Society, welcomes you!

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Ask A Mediator



Dear Patricia,

My partner and I are living together happily except that I feel uncomfortable that she is supporting me financially while my career gets going. I

have tried talking about my discomfort but she just waves me aside and tells me she loves me and not to worry about it. But I do! Is there anything I could do to ensure I get a chance to talk? I would like to have an understanding that we will right the imbalance when I can afford to pay her back.

Dear Reader,

It takes guts, determination and a lot of time to get a new career going. Sometimes there doesn't seem to be enough time to do the talking our relationships need! I applaud your self-awareness that you know you need something that is missing. It's tempting to allow differences to be waved aside when we are short of time. Yet those differences can stack up and eventually cause real problems! I suggest you keep on trying to have the conversation.

You might begin by letting her know that you are uncomfortable with the status quo and that you wish to make a date to have the talk. Listen to see if she responds by repeating the message about "loving you and not wanting you to worry about it". People who repeat phrases over and over usually do so because they feel unheard. Tell her you have heard that she loves you and wishes to have you worry less. Affirm her caring and thank her for it.

Then repeat your desire to have the conversation and ask her to name a time that would work for her. If she asks why you need to continue given her statement, tell her that you need to do so for your own peace of mind.



She cannot make your mind peaceful no matter how much she cares about you. Only you can do that. Repeat your request for a time.

During the talk explore the concept of "balance". You talk about correcting the "imbalance". Ask her whether she feels any? If she doesn't, ask her how she defines "balance". Tell her how you define it. Maybe you can understand each other better once you clarify this concept. Perhaps she has been expecting that you will pay her back but did not want to burden you with the actual numbers at this time. If you would like to work out the numbers do so after you have worked on the concept of balance. If you are contributing in non financial ways both of you value, you might build that into the "balance sheet".

Sometimes people find it easier to do this work with a third party present to help manage the emotional climate and keep things on track. Mediators can also assist us to learn new skills to apply in the future which can bring lasting rewards.

Pat Califia on same sex marriages: "Rather than have gay marriage, I think we should have a plurality of contracts that individuals make with one another...It's very sad for me, as sort of an aging hippie, to see the gay community abandon its original radical premise — which was to transform gender and our social definitions of love and relationship and intimacy - and attempt to dress ourselves up in heterosexual clothing and pretend that we're just like everybody else. I think it's a big mistake, and I don't think it will ever really work. It's also just boring."

Lesbian Avenger Liz Harris on Exodus International, an umbrella agency of fundamentalist groups that work to transform homosexuals into heterosexuals: "If anyone deserves a plague of biblical proportions right now, it's the radical right. "Members of the San Francisco Avengers settled for crickets (locusts weren't available -ed see Exodus 7-11) releasing approximately a thousand bugs into the Bay Area office of Exodus. By the time police arrived, the Avengers had flown.

So, Shirt You, Gal!

Ed note: We asked Sue to write why she takes her shirt off. This is her story.



ow...taking my shirt off is a big deal! I get on TV and the radio and even asked to

write about it. When I'm asked why do I take my shirt off, my thought is why don't I take my shirt off.

As a kid growing up in Southern California I loved running around the neighborhood barefoot, shorts and no shirt — my natural state. When I was around 11 one of my gang pointed out that I didn't have a shirt on and I was a girl. I was stunned that one day it was O.K. and the next I had broken a big taboo. I put my shirt on.

Now at 45, and again, questioning my cultural values around why I do things, I'm taking it off, and I must admit having fun doing it. For me it's about being proud of who I am. It's about feeling the sun and air on my

body. It's about my rights. It's about breaking the law. It's about normalizing women's bodies. And yes, it's about fucking with people's heads.

In many cultures of the world, women do not wear tops/shirts /bras/ blouses. In our North American het culture women are told everyday how they should look and act. Think, soft, modest, hair on your head but not on your body and certainly not on your face. In reality we come in all different shapes, sizes and attitudes. My stretch marks, scars, hair, wrinkles, and sags tell the story of who I am. They show my age and life experience. They make me a real person.

When I take my shirt off in the lesbian community I don't worry about getting beat up or raped. Judged and criticized maybe, but not physically harmed. Men have eroticized my breasts and then made laws to keep them covered up. Who is this law protecting when I choose to take my shirt off?

I've also been playing with gender fucking and this too relates to my going shirtless. It used to embarrass and piss me off when people would mistake me for a man, yes I am butch! So I've been experimenting. People often think I'm a man. When I wear a mustache (I've let mine grow) and dress like a man, people think I'm a woman. When I dress like a woman, people think I'm a man in drag or a transsexual. When I wear a mustache and not a shirt, people don't know what I am. I'm using my muscles, breasts, the hair on my legs, face and my hips to be multi-gendered. I'm smiling and shaking my head — go figure.

So my reasons for going shirtless are varied and may be different on each occasion. I don't care if you join me or not but if you keep your shirt on I do care that you've asked yourself why. ??

tation. Many of the contentious statements have already been endorsed in existing UN documents.

One of the earliest reported problems was that certain NGO's - specifically Tibetan and lesbian groups - were being refused accreditation to the UN Conference. It took some searching and prompting to obtain the latest information on lesbian accreditation. The International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission, based in San-Francisco, informs me that, as far as they know, 10 lesbian organizations have been accredited: IGLHRC (U.S.), ILGA (U.S.), Egale (Canada), COC (Netherlands), LLH (Norway), RFSL (Sweden), CLIC (Philippines), El Closet de Sor Juana (Mexico), Mautner Project for Lesbians with Cancer (USA), and the Coalition of Activist Lesbians (COAL) - a coalition of Australian lesbian groups established to ensure that lesbian voices are heard in Beijing.

Lesbians and Human Rights in China

Information on human rights in China which has been disseminated as background to the UN Conference and Forum contains almost no mention of lesbians. A 12-page document by Human Rights Watch in Washington, D.C. provides meticulous detail on various human rights restrictions and reper-

traveller can bring into the country, but makes no mention of lesbians. I've had no reply to my request for information on how police deal with suspected lesbians. A document from the R.F. Kennedy Memorial Center for Human Rights notes that public awareness and discussion of abuses towards women, including abuse directed at lesbians, is effectively prevented because of the Communist Party's injunction that 'most news should be positive'. A statement by the Women's Working Group of War Resisters International, which is boycotting the UN Conference because of human rights abuses in China, makes the most informative reference, noting that there have been reports for over 15 years that "electro-convulsive 'therapy' and medicine to induce vomiting are widely used to 'cure' homosexuality". (Women interested in a Chinese lesbian's experience might look out for Red Azalea (1994), by Anchee Lin.

THERAPY: GETTING STARTED

The first step into therapy is one you may make for any number of immediate reasons related to a crisis or to chronic problems, but it is fundamentally one for your relationship with your self. Making you important in your life is all by itself a step in healing.

For many, dialling that number means acknowledging to ourselves that we need help. We may feel we've tried other avenues and come up with a blank. For some people it is a relief to say, "OK, I give up trying to do this alone. I'm going to get help". For others needing help makes them feel vulnerable. People are often afraid of what they will find "lurking" in the shadows of their psyche. I remember when I was entering therapy, being convinced some unusually scary and unacceptable monsters were hiding in my shadows. Over the years I have come to respect the subconscious as a wise teacher both for myself and my clients. That teacher speaks to us through dreams, fantasies, mental conversation, body messages and intuition; therapy should teach us to listen to these inner voices. In my experience that wise teacher is a trustworthy guide to our healing.

When you start therapy, it helps to begin with what is really bugging you or dominating your thoughts. But there is no "right" way to begin - only your way. If you go to where the struggle and discomfort is in your life, you will be led to the most central issues you need to deal with.

However, it is not necessarily that struggle we go to first, because we may need to test the therapist: "what does she know about my culture and community, will I trust her judgment, will I be judged, will I feel safe enough to reveal myself, will I be accepted if I cry - or if I refuse to cry?"

By allowing our mistrust to show, we establish whether a therapist can really make room for us and accept us. By showing her our struggles, we find out whether she is open and present when we're having our own feelings - and what she has to offer to help us.

We may imagine the therapist has judgments or attitudes that she does not have - or we may be right. Checking out what the therapist is thinking or feeling is an important part of building this relationship.

To begin with then, therapy is a process of testing and experimenting, figuring out what we will show and what we will keep hidden, getting used to the therapist and what this therapeutic relationship is about. It is also the beginning of learning to trust the healing possibilities of our own inner guidance.





Look, Honey, It's The RelationShip!

I was just thinking that relationships don't work and then things got better and so I was in the process of adjusting that to sometimes they don't work but they can work better, when a friend gave me Sonia Johnson's "The Ship That Sailed Into The Living Room" to read.

I thought it was pretty out-there, before I got to the part about her having been married to a man for twenty years and I realized the Johnson in question was not Jill, but Sonia.

Anyway, by that time it was too late. I had already decided that I probably wasn't going to pay much attention to a feminist analysis of why Lesbian relationships don't work written by a woman who'd been straight for over thirty years and then jumped into a live-in joined-at-thehip relationship with the first woman she had sex with.

Not only that, they worked together, at home, in the same house. No need to drag the patriarchy into it, simple propinquity would take care of whatever they had going for them to begin with. It's a miracle they lasted as long as they did.

I like to know these personal details about someone before I invite her theory into my life. Theories,

after all, are easier to come by than results.

I admit that Sonia had anticipated my reaction. She knew that I ("women" she wrote, knowing it would be more than just me) would ignore her good advice and go on doing whatever I ("we", that's me and all the rest) felt like doing, and she wrote that in her book, which, I thought, is insufferable arrogance, but at least it's honest. At that point having forgiven her for my mistaking her for Jill — I started to like Sonia.

At the core of her analysis is the Lesbian/feminist position about relationships: the marriage model of relationship is the domination of women by men, achieved by means of the economic and sexual domination inherent in the role of wife. Sonia generalizes from the marriage model to society as a whole. Our society is based on domination; domination is in fact systemic. That means all relationships are based on domination, including Lesbian relationships, which is why they don't (she says: can't) work. No relationships will work until the patriarchy is ... well, you can guess the rest.

But I meant it when I said I started to like Sonia, because she says some challenging things. I can't argue with systemic dominance, for example. And I can't ignore the way in which she relentlessly analyses herself and her own relationships. Her willingness to confront the uncomfortable encouraged me to look at those things for myself. Do dominance and ownership fit into my picture of relationship? Have I given authority over my intimacy to a patriarchal institution, as in relationShip? Why do I define myself in terms of whom I'm having — or not having — sex with, as in "couple" or "single?"

It's very unlikely that we (she means "all women" — another thing she does that picks my ass) will achieve liberation from the patriarchy if it depends on us not having sex, as Sonia recommends. But at least we can read the book.
