STATEMENT OF THE B.C. EXECUTIVE OF THE VOICE OF WOMEN PASSED UNANIMOUSLY AT THE MEETING ON OCTOBER 19 IN NANAIMO.

The federal and provincial governments and several mining companies are preparing to exploit B.C.'s uranium deposits in Clearwater north of Kamloops, in Kelowna and possibly in other places.

VOW believes that the question of uranium mining should be

discussed in a full judicial inquiry before any decisions are made.

The people of B.C. and especially the residents of the communities directly involved must be the ones to make the decision.

Uranium tailings are radioactive for 100,000 years. The hazards of cancer among uranium miners and to the general community are well documented. Recent studies show that the danger of so-called low-

level radiation has been grossly underestimated.

The Voice of Women is alarmed that the uranium mining industry and the nuclear industry generally have been irresponsible as regards

the health of the public in Canada.

VOW support all organizations and individuals who are calling for a full judicial inquiry immediately with democratic participation at all levels in the making of this crucial decision.

We hope that VOICES all over B.C. will find ways to publicize this statement - in your local press, on radio and TV.

CONTROL OF THE PROPERTY OF THE

CRABSHELL ALLIANCE is a group of concerned persons throughout Washington State and the Pacific Northwest, committed to an immediate halt to the construction and operation of nuclear power plants in Washington, the Pacific Northwest, the nation, and throughout the world. They oppose the proposed construction of nuclear plants at Satsop and the Skagit Valley in Washington, and the proposed Pebble Springs Plant, in Oregon. They call for the immediate cessation of operation of the Trojan Plant in Oregon, and the N-Reactor at Hanford, Washington. (All these plants are uncomfortably close to southern B.C.) They also oppose plans to designate the federal Hanford Atomic Reservation as the nation's major nuclear wastes depository. This is the same HANFORD mentioned by Dr. Helen Caldecott (see book page) - referring to atomic wastes. big vats of it and a couple of years ago they lost 115,000 gallons. It's several hundred feet from the Columbia River." The salmon being caught in great numbers around Victoria right now are said to be coming up from this same Columbia River. Therefore, apart from the many possibilities of disaster from the nuclear plant itself, there is the added danger of gallons of liquid waste getting into rivers. Then we have radioactive iodine concentrated hundreds of times in fish, also plutonium, and strontium. These radioactive elements are taken up from the water by the grass and then there is a gradual progression of concentration up through the food chain. - all of this should be reason enough for the inhabitants of B.C. to give their full support to the CRABSHELL ALLIANCE.

WEST COAST OIL PORTS INQUIRY

The recent announcement of the formal hearings of the Inquiry was followed by criticism by David Anderson who represented the B.C. Wildlife Federation in earlier hearings. The Inquiry was started in March by federal Justice Minister Ron Basford, to study the impact of an oil port at Kitimat and had a budget of \$1.4 million. A request for a further \$2.3 million and an extension of time was refused. Mr Anderson described the Inquiry as "just one glorious con game" with the Canadian taxpayer as the victim.

An interesting publication which arose as a result of the inquiry was "West Coast" - "a digest of evidence presented to the West Coast Oil Ports Inquiry, which was sent free of charge to anyone interested. It was to have been produced bi-monthly when the hearings resumed in September but its future seems doubtful under the circumstances. This inquiry could probably be described as "another safety valve on the pressure cooker" and at \$1.4 million could be said to contradict

the old adage that "talk is cheap".

The 5th annual conference sponsored by Victoria and UVic Status of Women action groups was held Oct. 28 and 29 at U.Vic. Victoria VOW participated and had a table of literature.

MX: HAIR TRIGGER ON NUCLEAR WAR

The October 6 announcement by US Defense Secretary Harold Brown of approval for \$250 million for preliminary research and development of the MX-mobile missle follows the October 5 headline "U.S. offers Soviets 50% N-arms Slash:

This MX, together with the B-l bomber, the Trident submarine and missile system and the Cruise missile, form a whole new range of weapons systems in the United States in their developing first-strike technology. This frightening shift in policy from "deterrence" to "aggression" causes further alarm for those concerned with the probability

of nuclear holocaust, by accident or design.

Unfortunately, the concerned citizens seem still to be over-whelmingly outnumbered by the apathetic majority. Among those who believe the proliferation of nuclear weaponry and nuclear energy to be the gravest threat to the human race today are Daniel Ellsberg, Dr. George Wald, David McReynolds, Norma Becker, Sidney Lens and others, who are leading a significant "peoples' movement for peace". Through their efforts, on April 23/77, representatives of 49 organizations met in Philadelphia to form the Mobilization for Survival. Their call for action states:

"Our purpose is to take up once again the struggle for a nuclear policy which accords with the requirements of sanity and survival. While our cities decay, while the environment deteriorates, while the plight of the unemployed, the old, the young, the poor and the sick is forgotten, money which could be devoted to genuine needs goes instead to the development of more "efficient", more elaborate, and more murderous weapons systems - - which are deployed in numbers almost beyond comprehension."

The MOBILIZATION intends to build upon and expand the efforts already started by numerous groups across the country; to reawaken public awareness of the scale of the threat which faces us all in our times; to channel this awareness into dramatic and effective actions; to take the initiative from those with a vested interest in the arms race; to build a truly massive movement which can change the policies and direction of the nation; and to achieve a transformation of consciousness on the International level, incooperation with groups active in Europe, Asia and the Third World.

(Interesting to note that Canada is not mentioned. Perhaps Dr. Wald etc. realize that Uncle Sam has already had beaver for breakfast - or mabe they just don't hold much hope for the apathetic Canadian? Also, what about Mexico - in with the Third World? - Ed.)

MOBILIZATION has held nationwide teach-ins and speak-outs on campuses and communities and plan a nationwide day "To Stop the Arms Race and Fund Our Communities" in Spring/78. in May/78 there will be mass demonstrations in New York and other major US cities at the time of the <u>U.N. Special</u> Assembly on Disarmament.

THE CANADIAN AID FOR VIETNAM CIVILIANS under the chairmanship of Alan M. Inglis, M.D., F.R.C.S.(C), has launched a campaign to raise \$50,000 to equip a 100 bed District Hospital at Tien Son, to be known as the 'Canada-Vietnam Hospital'. Application has been made to the Canadian International Development Agency for a doubling grant of \$100,000 to make a total of \$150,000.

Since the first shipment in August, 1966, C.A.V.C. has sent 46 shipments to Vietnam via Soviet freighters (free of charge), and the 47th shipment now being sent, including 3 cartons of long-acting penicillin - will bring

the total value of shipments so far to \$280,650.

Latest news releases concerning NATO and the Soviet threat, and whether or not this will influence President Carter to agree to the manufacture of the Neutron bomb, would indicate that members of the Committee on the Present Danger are hard at work. A report on this Committee appeared on page 3 of the "B.C. Voice", July/77. A recent program on TV dealing with NATO could well have been among the TV specials, magazine articles and newspaper columns designed to create fear and a bigger military budget.

Since the corporations included in the Committee on the Present Danger are practically identical with those represented in the Tri-lateral Commission, of which President Carter is a member, there certainly is cause for raised eyebrows when President Carter promises to cut the military budget and to work to reverse the arms race.

An interesting report from the "Washington Post":

. CIA testified last fall that "the USSR has not a single weapons system demonstrating technical superiority over the US. Moscow spends more on defense that the US ... because the Soviet system is weaker and less efficient."

• A Library of Congress study shows the US leading the USSR "in strategic warheads by almost 2:1, in MIRVedICBMs (multiple-warhead long-range missiles) by 5:1, in MIRVed submarine missiles by 4:0, and in heavy bombers by almost 3:1. Russia trails . . not only in number of warheads but in the most crucial factor today, accuracy."

. U.S. and NATO military manpower equals the total Warsaw Pact manpower. (By some estimates, the Soviet Union has up to a million troops

along the long and disputed Chinese frontier.)

. America leads the USSR by many years in the technology of cruise missiles, warhead accuracy and guidance, submarine detection and computers. The highly touted MIG-25, for example, turns out to lag US performance by 10 years and is designed against a threat long superceded by our low-flying bombers. The MIG-25 has long been known to carry a payload only one-fifth that of an F-4 and with a much shorter range."

. "The Kremlin faces strategic problems far more severe than Washington's. It must prepare against a nuclear threat not only from the US, but from China, France, Britain and NATO countries with 'two-key systems controlled by Washington... Russia"s geography locks the Soviet waterways dominated by Turkey, Norway and Japan." (Walter C. Clemens Jr. of the Kennan Institute in the Washington Post', and

reprinted in the "Washington Spectator)

The "Spectator" points out the choice before Carter and America: whether to drift on with the military public works program, or to invest in basic social capital: people, land and water ..... The voices the President must listen to are those who recognize that we are living in a world of the absurd and the damned, a world in which weapons of mass destruction are being manufactured while millions starve and a nuclear exchange, with its fallout, could destroy us all.

THE NEUTRON BOMB - (THE "CLEAN" BOMB)

Excerpts from Robert Ellsberg's article in the July-Aug issue of "The Catholic Worker".

"The neutron bomb is a small, simple form of nuclear weapon, in essence, the trigger for the Hiroshima bomb. It can be fired from artillery or attached to a short-range missile. The neutron bomb does not kill primarily by blast or heat, but by an intense burst of lethal neutron and gamma rays, something like what you might receive under the dentist's X-ray (only 8000 times more powerful). It creates almost no damage to buildings and other real estate. It kills only living creatures every one of them within a mile radius.

The clean bomb leaves the battlefield, town or village clean and sanitized, no lingering fall-out, no blood. Enemy personnel will be 'incapacitated immediately by agonizing convulsions, intermittant stupor and loss of muscular co-ordination'. Death will come slowly, anywhere

from a few hours to several days later.

The Pentagon has long desired a weapon like this . . For it is all very well to have 50 megaton bombs in one's arsenal, but in reality when are you going to use a weapon like that? .. The neutron bomb, in contrast, is eminently practical. . . It is small, it is 'precise', doesn't put an area off-limits for months. In other words it serves to further blur the distinction between nuclear and "conventional" weapons; it tempts the president with the possibility of using "tactical nuclear weapons" without precipitating a general holocaust. It invites use . . Virtually all discussion of the neutron bomb has agreed with the premise that this weapon is designated for our NATO allies, and indeed one news story had several European statesmen nodding their assent to the clean bomb . . Every year since Hiroshima, either the United States, or one of our allies, has been fighting a small - one must say Imperialistic -'limited' war, in some distant corner of the globe. Lately we have been losing these wars. Only the fact that it is being developed several years too late makes the use of the neutron bomb one crime which this country has spared the people of Indochina ... The development of the neutron bomb is only a rather startling indication of the progress we have made in completing the subjection of human beings to their own material creations. In the same process by which the lesser of two evils comes to be seen as no longer evil but a positive good, a device which inflicts indiscriminate death within a prescribed radius while sparing property, is actually described as being relatively "humane". That this is possible suggests a pathological insensitivity, the roots of which go far deeper than a simple perversity of language ... When a civilization elects to celebrate not moral but technical achievements, it is inevitable that the final unsolved problem left to technology will be how to remove the corpses when the battle is over .. "



In a later statement, Ellsberg said that while on field trips in Korea he learned that authority to give a nuclear "go ahead" had been delegated to field commanders, down to the rank of major.

This negates the belief held by many that only a president (same or

mad) could have this power.

### TRIDENT AND NUREMBERG

(from "Judgement after Nuremberg" -- Ben Metcalfe, B C Today, Aug. 15)

.... The issue of the Trident protest is not the location of a nuclear submarine base. It is the imminence of the nuclear holocaust, and that issue transcends every national, ideological and political consideration, for it confronts us not as Canadians, Americans, Russians or Chinese, but as a species, and as a species we must act.

Our first law of nature is the survival of our species and we consequently must obey that law first. Just as Nuremberg rendered the courts and laws of the land inferior to the laws of humanity, so does the imminence of the nuclear holocaust and the extinction of our species render our laws of any kind inferior to the laws of humanity.

What is the practical implication of that principle? For the people merely to petition the state to disarm is delusive; but for the people actually to cause the state to disarm is revolutionary; and yet clearly it must be done.

While it is probably already true that in this techtronic age the combined national elites of Canada, the United States, Japan, France, West Germany and Italy could conduct a total and instant nuclear war without the general populations being involved at all--except as incinerated and/or irradiated corpses--a great deal of elitist power still derives from the people, directly and indirectly.

It is therefore the people who are both directly and indirectly responsible for disarmament inasmuch as they are capable of bringing it about by taking back from their leaders the power they give them in the form of money, labour skills, votes, obedience, etcetera.

Not on a mass scale, of course, but only on an individual basis at first can such action be initiated. Only when masses of people become aware of the imminence of their nuclear destruction will masses of people act. The Trident protest and others must create that awareness.

Political assistance would be helpful, of course, but, as history demonstrates, not necessary. Which is just as well because there is no political help available in any of the political parties of Canada, the United States, Britain or elsewhere. All of these parties are committed overtly or covertly to our nuclear policies.

Indeed, the traditional social groupings and institutions are notoriously short-sighted, including "socialists". The anti-war movement is essentially, and must remain, totally non-partisan.

Finally, if it is to achieve consensus and ever-increasing support, it must be predicated upon such incontrovertible truths as the Nuremberg principles, for even the 'enemy' once subscribed to those.
