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## WHY WILPF IS BEING FEATURED IN THIS ISSUE OF THE VOICE:

1977 YOW National Newsletter, Donna Elliott, National Co-ordinator:
"I talked with all groups about the proposal of Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF) that there be some kind of affiliation between their organization and ours. Since there is no provision in their constitution for affiliation, WILPF has suggested that VOW become a national section of WILPF, maintaining its autonomy and name. Under our letterhead would read, in smaller print, 'National Section of WILPF.' Of course, no final decision has been made on this, nor will it be made until we can have an annual meeting."

Voice of Women Annual Meeting in Toronto, October 15: A motion "that decision re membership in WILPF be deferred for one year." (Kay Macpherson/Alice Coppard) Motion carried.

B.C. Executive, Voice of Women, gave its approval to a motion that the Canadian Voice of Women ally itself with the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, in whatever way may be constitutionally feasible.

The Vancouver Branch of WILPF was established in 1921. Mrs. J.S. Woodsworth, Mrs. Laura Jamieson, Mrs. Dorothy Steeves and Miss Kate Lane were among its founders.

What effect can or will women have on international affairs, on armaments, on militarization? . . . I see the route forward in human relations as a non-viclent one, not as much because I see women as intrinsically more peace-loving (though indeed it is possible that overall they are) but because . . I believe that the bonus from learning to co-operate and to treat each other with love and respect instead of fear will be beyond estimation and will diminish the sum total of violence in the world. . . .

As for armaments, given the reduction in the will to war which could follow on the development of a more co-operative society, fiscal priorities will change and we shall no longer be willing to hand over such vast sums to those who produce nothing but a means of destruction.

A related area is that of international relations. International relations is a field traditionally quite outside the sphere of women's influence. It has not always - perhaps it has never ever - been cutside the scope of her interest. The first world war was a time of change for women in Europe, Britain and North America. They were called on to work in all kinds of activities previously closed to them and they astonished everyone - even themselves - by their competence in occupations they had repeatedly been told they couldn't possibly tackle.

IT IS LESS WELL KNOWN that a considerable number — mostly women activists who had campaigned strenuously for the vote but had rejected the viol ent extremes of the militant suffragettes — found themselves unable to commit themselves to support a fight to the finish and began early in the war to seek out means of bringing the war to as just an end as possible, and of fostering education towards a more peaceful world order when it was over. REFUSING TO DEFER to those who told them that they couldn't possibly meet during wartime without themselves breaking up in violent quarrels, WOMEN FROM MOST OF THE BELLIGERENT AND A NUMBER OF NEUTRAL COUNTRIES CONVENED IN APRIL 1915 AT THE HAGUE. They ruled out of order recrimination on war guilt and set to work to plan for peace. Several things emerged from their conference. THE WOMEN'S INTERNATIONAL LEAGUE FOR PEACE AND FREEDOM was inaugurated. The Congress adopted a proposal for a practical approach to peace negotiations, which was drawn up in fact by a young Canadian woman, Julia Grace Wales.

AFTER THE SPECIAL SESSION ON DISARMAMENT IN 1978, Kay Camp, international president of WILPF, addressed the President of the U.S.A. as follows:

"You know that there is no defense against nuclear war... We will be far more secure with world disarmament under effective verification and control, than in the saturation of the globe with the means of mass annihilation.

"You know that the arms race is a bad investment. Years of excessive military spending have seriously damaged the economy. Military spending is inflationary. It produces fewer jobs than does equivalent spending for housing, health care or education.

"Yet your administration downgraded the importance of the First United Nations Special Session devoted to Disarmament, doing ourselves and the world a grave injustice. We lost a great opportunity for leadership in a global course of action which is inevitable if humanity is to survive."

Seven jet fighters were sent aloft from CFB Comox early Friday morning in response to a false missile alert apparently caused by computer error.

Although Military authorities say it took only six minutes to correct the error and call the fighters back, CFB Comox pilots probably thought they were facing the real thing—an air attack from the Soviet Union.

The seven CF-101 Voodoo jets that were scrambled in response to the missile alert had to take off without being fully armed. Only two of the planes carried missiles of the conventional infra-red, air-to-air type, while the other five were unarmed.

The Voodoo is primarily designed to carry nuclear warhead-equipped missiles, but there wasn't time Friday morning to arm the planes.

CFB Comox information officer Maj. Jim Gregory said the alert, received about 8 a.m., came as such a "surprise" that the five unarmed jets took off to avoid being destroyed on the ground in the event of an attack on the base.

Normally, he said, there would be a "build-up" of alerts allowing personnel time to arm the fighters with nuclear weapons before taking to the air...

CFB Comox personnel and aircrews came up with an "excellent" response to Friday's surprise alert, Maj. Gregory said, adding that their 'adrenalin probably flowed a little quicker." But he said the crews are trained all the time to react to the threat of a real Soviet air attack...

More than 63,000 man-made chemicals are now in commercial use; they are increasing at about 1,000 more per year.

Too little is known, (and what is known is often unheeded), of even short-term effects - let alone any great knowledge of long-term effects.

There is very little being done about searching for alternatives to chemicals.

THERE ARE TOO FEW TOXOLOGISTS, a totally inadequate number even to test for harmful effects, the masses of chemicals surrounding us.

Say the authors, "Chemical technology is outstripping our knowledge of the same biological effects of chemicals. All chemicals, in some form, eventually end up in the environment, where they have the potential to cause harm to the humans and other species."

We are apt to stress nuclear hazards, uranium mining, mercury, lead, asbestos, etc. But there are so many others whose dangers have not yet shown themselves to be so pronounced, - or those dangers have been kept from us. So many chemicals in common use are quite unnecessary.

These two books complement each other. They deal, with sympathetic understanding, with the penal system and all its shortcomings and injustices. Claire's book details tragic happenings and appalling conditions at the B.C. Pen. She details the lack of adequate methods to deal with prisoners, and with the inadequacies of the Parole system in Canada. Dr. Richmond sees poor nutrition as a factor in behavioral abnormalities.

:THE RICH WORLD'S PORR - A New Internationalist guide to those who don't have enough and those who have more than enough.:

Officially, most Western nations have established poverty lines — usually a figure somewhere near one—half the average family income. If a family spends two—thirds of its income on basic necessities it is likely to live below the poverty line.

In the US an estimated ten percent of all families are poor.

In the UK there are close to eight million people below the poverty line; nearly 15% of the population

In Canada, nearly 20 percent of the population - about 4.5 mg million - live below the official poverty line.

In the US in 1972, women in fulltime work earned only 58 cents for every dollar earned by men.

In Canada in 1973 only 4.2 percent of all women workers had managerial jobs.

In Canada nearly 25 percent of children under 16 are poor.

In the UK in 1976, women with husbands in the top social class had a death rate 35% below the national average; women whose husbands were in unskilled occupations had a death rate 65% above the national average.

There are many forms of TORTWIRE which those caught in the net of one sort or another have no choice but to suffer. Some are shockingly overt and obvious; others are insidious, slow and quietly accomplished. We, in VOW, set ourselves against every kind of torture, every type of inhumanity. #### TAXES FOR PEACE. NOT WAR.

Statement of Principles: In two World Wars, Canadian governments respected the right of conscientious objectors to refuse to kill, and exempted them from military service, approving alternative services of a non-combatative, humanitarian nature.

(In some Provinces, taxpayers allocate school taxes according to conscience, to whichever school system they prefer, denominational or otherwise.)

Modern warfare, with its emphasis on expensive weapons depends more on arms than on armies. Personal refusal to kill is not enough to absolve the individual from responsibility for killing. The strength of the Warmachine depends on those who pay for it through taxes.

Therefore our government should provide, for those who object on religious and ethical grounds, a legal alternative to war taxes such as A PEACE TAX FUND, to which the portion of their taxes, equivalent to the war taxes, could be directed. \* About 333,000 single, widowed or divorced wom
