Sadler Praises and Frowns on L.B.C. Performance

The performance of the London Boxing Club on the field at Swangard Stadium on Sunday, 11th May, 1975 was a credit to the Club, and players and management alike should be justly proud

It is too bad that glory of accomplishment in winning the coveted Province Cup should be overshadowed by the performance of the team during the presentation of the awards and by the comments and criticisms emanating from various players and officials of the Club against organized soccer on Vancouver Island and the British Columbia Soccer Commission.

Much has been said over the last year or so against the principle of regionalized soccer in British Columbia, but little or nothing is ever said about the benefits of the system in the overall development of the game, particularly in those areas outside the boundaries of Metropolitan Vancouver.

If this great game of soccer is to progress in British Columbia and in Canada, the natural climatic and travel problems are sufficient deterrent without limiting the development to the Vancouver area alone; surely we cannot sacrifice the needs and wishes of the majority for what are obviously purely selfish demands of an isolated few objectionists.

If the London Boxing Club are so enamoured with the British Columbia Soccer League, then maybe those players, who are dissatisfied, should move to Vancouver and play in that league instead of openly criticizing the game on Vancouver Island at every opportunity.

The London Boxing Club would do well to consider just who provided the opportunity for their Club to compete in the Province Cup Competition. The Vancouver Island Region payed their \$100.00 entry fee, the British Columbia Soccer Commission provided \$175.00 towards the Club's travel expenses, and the right to have a regional winner enter the cup competition at the semi-final level was a direct result of the efforts of the two Vancouver Island Commission members, with the support of Doug Day, the Island Regional President.

This principle was supported by all regional districts except Vancouver and is a vast improvement over the past when great teams from the Victoria area, such as the Victoria O'Keefes, the then Kennedy Cup winners and the Victoria West United league and playoff winners, were literally forced to decline entry in the Province Cup by virtue of being required to play several early round games on the Mainlard in open parks, with no financial assistance being provided.

As an officer of both these great Clubs I was well aware of the economic problems involved in enterring an amateur club into such a financially disastrous arrangement. I was also aware of the total disappointment of the Island players concerned.

It would appear to me that the criticisms of the London Boxing Club against the present system are without foundation, and are based upon purely selfish interests and an ignorance of the history of the game on Vancouver Island.

The problems related to inter city competition, particularly between Vancouver Island and the Lower Mainland are well known by those who have spent a lifetime in amateur sport and to prolong a system which increases the problems without any visible signs of true progress in the development of the game itself would be futile.

It is fortunate indeed that the game of soccer on Vancouver Island can, despite the barbs and criticisms of the London Boxing Club continue to enjoy the benefits of many years of experience as is provided by men like Art Shaw, Doug Day, Tom Forrester and many others who have the respect of the majority of the sporting fraternity, a respect that was earned by a dedication and integrity in office at all levels of the game.

Maybe the London Boxing Club should realize that respect and integrity must be earned. As the Province Cup winner and the official representative of Soccer in British Columbia at the upcoming inter-provincial competitions, I am of the opinion that a definite change in attitude would be most desirable.

Wests, who clearly dominated play in the first half, seemed content to protect their 3-1 half-time lead and didn't control much of the action following the intermission.

The club, which plays in the premier division of the Vancouver Island Soccer League, now advances to the Canadian championship tournament, starting Aug. 28 in Winnipeg. London Boxing Club of Victoria captured the title last year.

Just about to start a new season, Wests played superb soccer for the first 45 minutes, scoring two picture-book goals and connecting again on an error before the break.

McLaren is star of soccer show

Gary McLaren had himself quite a Sunday at Alexander Park, and if Winnipeg's Fort Rouge Soccer Club ever sees him again, it'll be too soon.

McLaren's heroics paced the Victoria West Club from British Columbia to the Canadian Soccer Association Challenge Trophy, emblematic of senior amateur supremacy in Canada.

Vic West have proven worthy successors to the London Boxing Club dynasty.


The Wests, who started by knocking off the Boxers in Cup play in Victoria and B.C. competition, succeeded them as Canadian National champions Sunday.




