ON BUYING SHOES

Genetic males have big feet! This is almost certainly not news to you, but for some of us it does present a problem in changing over to the male role. Until you tried to buy men's dress shoes, it may have been easy to ignore just how big a difference there is. But then you find that many men's shoe stores do not carry sizes smaller than 8! That's a man's size 8 and corresponds to a woman's size 9½. (To find the man's size corresponding to a woman's size, subtract one and a half.)

So - if you wear a woman's size 9½ or larger, you are lucky and only need to read this article out of general interest. If not, maybe I can offer some helpful hints. First, some more bad news. The smallest men's shoe size made is a 5, corresponding to a woman's 6½. If you wear an even smaller size than that, you will have to content yourself with wearing boy's shoes. To avoid the embarrassment (if it bothers you) of shopping in the boy's department, I can only suggest that you order shoes by mail through Sears or similar outlets.

In sizes between (men's) 5 and 8, availability of the styles you want will vary from store to store, and generally decrease toward the lower end of the size scale. Look in the Yellow Pages under "Shoes" - the ads for men's shoe stores will sometimes specify the sizes they carry, especially if they do have extra small or extra large sizes. Florsheim, Wright, and RedWing are some shoe brands that come in small sizes. Sometimes you may have to place a special order to get the size/style combination you want. The store will probably have a catalog that shows which styles come in your size--ask to see it.

I have been disappointed to learn that most companies that offer shoes by mail-order also do not carry the smaller sizes. The only one I have found that offers a good selection is the "Elevator" shoes from Richlee. If you would like the height-increasing feature, these are a good choice. They really are not obvious, are well made, goodlooking and not too

expensive. To get their catalog, write to: Richlee Shoe Company, P.O. Box 3566, Frederick, Maryland 21701. The major problem I have with them is simply that I feel embarrassed to take them off and suddenly become 2 inches shorter.

Also, you may want to consider the option of starting to wear shoes somewhat larger than you've been used to. It is always possible to put an insole, heel pad, tongue pad, etc. into a shoe to make it a little more comfortable if it's too large - also you can wear thick socks. But I have also found that I can simply get used to a looser-feeling shoe by persisting in wearing it. Even the difference between size 5½ and size 6 makes it noticeably easier to find what I want.

Finally, when you do find what you want, be sure to keep track of what worked. Try to remember such things as the store, the brand name, style name, and the exact size so that in the future you can repeat

your success.

Dear FTM,

Thank you for your booklet about the female-tomale crossdresser and transsexual. Although I've read it a dozen times from cover to cover, every day I pick it up and roam through it. It has been my salvation in a time when I have felt so alone. I found it clear and easy reading with a touch of gentle humor. I only wish I would have known about it sooner.

I am a female-to-male transsexual. I live in Hawaii with my partner Janet and our new edition (9 months old). Six months ago I came to terms with my transsexualism. Although I've known since I was a child that I was born into the wrong body, it's taken me 25 years to awaken the courage in myself to step out the door. I am more in line with life than I have ever been. Living in Hawaii has me pretty much isolated from the kind of support that I know I need. I'm being seen by a very wonderful doctor who is working with one other female-to-male. Unfortunately I do not know who this person is, so there is no one to share with. I have so many unanswered questions, so many unchartered thoughts that I lay awake at night for hours wondering how will I know, how can I know the answers. Although I know a lot of the answers must come from within, still I can't help but feel like having someone to share with who has been through the change would help a great deal. So I'm asking you if you know of anyone who would be interested in writing to me. If you know of someone, please share my address and phone number with them.

Janet and I were talking last night about how she too wished there was someone to talk with. She too feels alone. So once again if you know of anyone who would be willing to write to her or call, or if you know of any reading material that would be good to read, please let us know. Janet too has many unanswered questions. We are in couples counseling, yet there is nothing like sharing with someone who has been

down the road.

I did call Steve Dain and it was a pleasure talking to him. He is really a good source of information and I know he is there for me, yet I know I need to foster more relationships. So if you know of anyone who would like to share with us, please don't hesitate. I really wish there was a publication that we could write in and share our experiences. It's unusual for me to be this out because for the most part I'm a very private person.

'Very feminine' groom ordered to drop pants before wedding

COPENHAGEN — A West German couple's wedding went beyond the traditional when the bridegroom was ordered to drop his trousers to prove he was a man, a spokesman for the mayor in the small town of Aabenraa has confirmed.

"We had to make sure," said the spokesman, Ehlert B. Nielsen, who declined to identify the couple.

"We have a lot of foreign marriages here, and we have to be careful," Nielsen said.

The officials were concerned about the Friday ceremony because the groom "looked very feminine and was heavily made up," Nielsen said. A mistranslation in the man's West German identity papers also had labeled him as a "tochter" or daughter.

A local policeman was called to

the office, Nielsen said, and the man was asked "to go into an adjoining room to drop his trousers" so the authorities could check tomake sure he was indeed a man.

"He was, and we married the couple," Nielsen said.

"They took it quite well considering," Nielsen added. "They could see that under the circumstances we were in doubt and promised to have the groom's papers corrected when they got back to West Germany."

If the couple had waited another six months to get married it probably would not have made any difference whether the groom was male or female.

At the end of 1988 a new law comes into effect in Denmark providing for registered partnerships between individuals of the same sex.

Under the law, couples of the same sex will be able to marry.
