NINETY NEIGHBORS NIX NERDS

A few hours after a woman was attacked near Clark Park, this leaflet was distributed in the attackers' neighbourhood. Ninety women, brought out by a fast-acting telephone tree, gathered in front of the men's house at midnight June 1 to let them know that this kind of abuse won't be tolerated.

Although the men talked tough, it was clear that this time the women were the ones with the clout. While the women made their statements, neighbours came out to express support for the action, many saying that these men had caused

trouble in the past and they were glad to see them confronted.

Actions like this make it clear that abuse and harrassment of women will not be tolerated and strong and immediate collective action is an essential ingredient in making safe streets.

A WOMAN WAS BEATEN LAST NIGHT!

She was walking home and was repeatedly verbally harassed. When she attempted to friend.

You may know these men. They are your neighbours. They live at 3342 Dumfries.

The words used by these attackers were "cunt" and "do you want this white ball up your cunt?" While she was being beaten, the other men stood around, laughed and said "let's fuck this cunt."

GUERRILLA LAWFARE

Talk about prejudicial: here's the Five trying to prepare their defence in an atmosphere that has already been poisoned by official slanders and Trial By Media, and along comes B.C. police czar Robin Bourne, the good ol' boy spy-chaser and subversive-hunter from Ottawa, to announce that simulated "war games" will be conducted in Vancouver harbor this fall to test against possible sabotage attacks.

The war games, and the resulting public fears whipped up by the authorities over a "terrorist" threat will take place just as the Five defence is attempting to pick an impartial jury to weigh charges that include conspiring to sabotage the oil industry icebreaker Terry Fox under construction in Vancouver harbor - some coincidence.

"We don't want people to think that Vancouver is a quiet town where they could take us by suprise," says the ever-alert Bourne, who made his mark in life compiling blacklists of dissidents.

Meanwhile, the Crown continues to put roadblocks in the way of the defence. On June 10, court officials tried a new tactic: they wouldn't allow friends of the Five into a bail

review hearing until the judge had entered the courtroom. Since everyone had to be frisked before being allowed in, that meant only one (1) person was present for the short hearing, while 30 more cooled their heels outside.

That hearing turned out to be just a formality, but Ann Hansen and Brent Taylor will be self-managing their bail review July 8. Friends of the Five will be there, so it makes sense for the court staff to devise some procedures to avoid bad feelings.

SPRAY IT, DON'T SAY IT

"The law does not concern itself with trifles."

Believe it or not, that was the judge's pronouncement (delivered in Latin, no less) in dismissing mischief charges against three young people June 2 who were accused of spraypainting "Get Rid of the Queen" on the Hastings Viaduct during her majesty's recent visit.

The judge obviously bought the defence argument that the "mischief" value of spraypaint is an individual aesthetic judgment, rather than a criminal concern and that the city's infamous anti-poster bylaw would be too vague to cut it under the freedom of expression provisions of the new Charter of Rights. (Penalties for being caught postering right now seem to be in the \$25 range - you can just mail in your fine, like a parking ticket.)

Where that leaves the right to spraypaint is anybody's guess. The Crown will have to get creative if it hopes to stop the flowering of free expression. Stay tuned for developments.
